In my judgment the council that gives the fire protection you mention, will long live in the memory of Newberry, especially by those that are afforded such little protection. C. S. Matthews & Co.'s saw mill, together with a lot of lumber, etc., was destroyed by fire last Thursday night, July 13.

This community was shocked beyond description last Saturday evening, July 15, when the news of the terrible tragedy of Mr. W. P. Bowers' sad death was spread. Mr. Bowers had gone to Little Mountain, and when returning home, just as he got to the edge of a patch of old pine trees just below Mr. L. A. Frick's was fatally shot. It is thought that he received three loads of large shot and several pistol balls, as he was very badly torn up. The body of the dead man was not found until about an hour after the shooting occurred. Magistrate Switzenburg was sent for as soon as the body was found and the inquest was held Saturday night. The verdict rendered by the jurors was that W. P. Bowers came to his death by gunshot wounds at the hands of some person or persons unknown to the jurors. An effort was made to get blood hounds, but none were obtained. Mr. Bowers was a well-to-do farmer, but not an friendly terms with his neighbors. He was about 41 years old and leaves a wife and seven children to mourn his death. It seems terrible that this barbarous act should take place right in our midst in what has always been a peaceable community, but such is the case, and we can only hope that the bold and daring assassin will be caught and meet the doom which he doubtless deserves. The Newberry Roller Mills.

This mill is now grinding regular every day, disposing of over 120 bushels every 12 hours. It grinds twice the amount in a day as the other roller mills in this section. While the others take the tenth toll it takes as much as the eighth, but then this mill's toll is three pounds more of flour to the bushel even with a toll. Besides, it makes whiter flour than any of the other roller mills and compares favorably with any flour on the market.

Parties come as far as 20 miles with their wheat because this mill makes the best turn-out and the whitest flour. Newberry can now boast of having one of the best equipped roller mills in the State and the best this side of Spartanburg and Greenville.

The reason it makes the best turn-out and the whitest flour is that it has been built with all the latest improvements in order to compete with the Western mills. First, there is a dust collector which collects the flour dust from the rolls. This dust in other mills is wasted, but here, by the aid of suction it is carried to the collector, heated and blown with the other flour. Second, a bran duster which dusts all the flour off the bran. In other mills the flour is left with the bran, but here it is separated, heated and blown with the other flour.

Dr. D. L. Bower, the proprietor of the above mill, increased the efficiency of his mill by procuring the services of Mr. W. R. Shark, an experienced miller, of Salem, Va.
