The dwelling was a large two-story building-said to be one of the best built in the county. In making his escape, Mr. Derrick

about the face and hands. All that was saved, was an organ and a sewing machine, everything else was completely destroyed, along with a lot of flour that Mr Derrick had recently had ground.

The fit originated in one of the upstairs rooms or loft, a spark. supposing to have blown in the window from the stove pipe.

There was no insurance and it is a complete loss to Mr. Derrick.

This mill consumes about four teen thousand bales of the fleecy staple annually. Richland and Granby mills by S. S. Birge. These mills cat up something like fifteen thousand bales every year Union Manufacturing Co by Wheeler & Bowers. This mill uses something like fifteen thousand bales annually, making a total of over one hundred thousand (100,000) bales. This ought to give us a first class cotton market, and we feel safe in saying that the planters will get the highest market price for their cotton at Prosperity this season.

from attending the correspondents picnic; and oh, me! how Josh Trump went for us boys. We will show him how he stands next year at his pienie, and we assure him that his suggested programme will not be blank for want of speakers The past week we have been on our

rounds again, after recovering enough strength from our spell of fever. We noticed some very good fields of cotton and corn on Monday and Tuesday in the St. Lukes, Harman Quarter and Utopia sections. Wednesday and Thursday we spent in Saluda County canvassing. We crossed Salada at Wyse's Ferry, and stopped a while at Mr. D. M. Bedenbaugh's mill and watched him saw.
