Douthit Pleads in Vain.

LAWYERS ASK THE BOARD TO GIVE HIM FURTHER HEARING. Resolutions Declare the Incident Closed and Refer the Matter to the Attorney General for Action. [Special to Greenville News.] Columbia, S. C., Oct. 4.—The Board of Control took no final action today on any of the cases resulting from the investigation of dispensary affairs. George Johnstone appeared as counsel for Mr. Douthit and asked, for re-opening of the case, vindication and a chance for a full hearing. He pleaded for an opportunity for a full hearing. He pleaded for an opportunity for the defence, insisting that Mr. Douthit had been given no proper hearing and ought to have a chance for one.

At the afternoon session Geo. E. Price and Colonel Johnstone argued against the right of the board to remove without opportunity for full hearing. After the arguments had been heard, the following, which will likely be adopted, was offered: "Whereas, under the dispensary law it is provided that the commissioner shall be subject to removal for cause by the State Board of Control and whereas, the committee duly appointed to investigate the receipts and disbursements of the contraband room, has, in its report, formally charged the Commissioner, J. B. Douthit, with gross irregularities and official misconduct, which, in the opinion of the Board of Control based upon his own admission, is sufficient cause for his removal, and for which cause the said board on yesterday removed him by vote of the board:

"And whereas formal demand has been made by his attorneys, Messrs. George Johnstone and Geo. E. Price, for a rehearing:

"Be it resolved, That the board, realizing its responsibilities and cognizant of its official duty in the premises, declines to reconsider its action and that so far as it is concerned, the incident must be closed.

"Resolved, further, That from this date and pending the election of a Commissioner all checks issued on account of the business of the board shall be issued and signed by the clerk, B. C. Webb, and countersigned by the chairman and no other person or persons.

"Resolved, further, That all papers relating to the said investigation be turned over to the Attorney General for such action as he deems proper to protect the interest of the State.

"Resolved, further, That a copy of these resolutions be served on Commissioner Douthit at once by the clerk."

Boydin and Williams wanted some provision made by Mr. Douthit to be given a hearing before the board. The others said it would be afforded without resolution and the board adjourned to sleep over the matter and act in the morning. There is much feeling in the board about the matter. The Outz case will be taken up tomorrow.

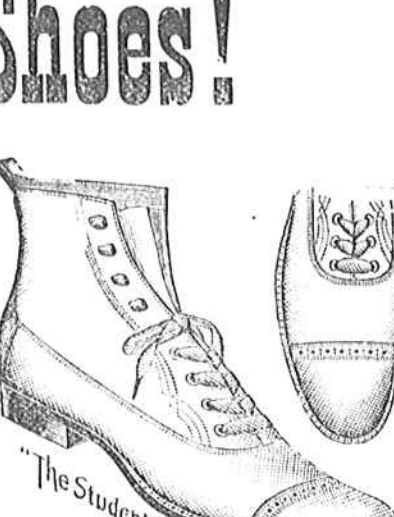
