ONE WAS CONVICTED ANOTHER IS ON TRIAL.

Swift Justice Being Done by the Law in Darlington.

(Special to the State.)

Darlington, Oct. 25 .- In the criminal court today Ed. Luckey, one of the principals in the Lamar rape case, was tried and found guilty. The other, Thomas Mitchell, is now being tried, and his conviction is a foregone conclusion. It is probable that at least two of the others will be indicted as accessories after the fact.

The case has attracted the attention of every one on account of the afrocity of the crime. The testimony today revealed the fact that the guilt of the principals is beyond question, and so complete that the young white woman who was choked into insensibility and brutally outraged was not compelled to appear in the court house. In fact her condition is still critical, although the deed was done 17 days ago. Ed. Luckey on the stand today confessed his complicity in the crime and is now being used as a witness against Mit-

Judge Benet in his charge to the jury congratulated the county of Darlington for her respect of law and justice and stated that an example had been set and give the consumer and not only in South Carolina but for the entire South.
