Make some meat at home, make plenty of corn, begin the year's work with the firm purpose to make cotton the surplus crop. Another great cotton acreage will be suicidal and will check the prosperity we are only beginning to feel.-Gaeenville

Raise hogs and eattle and sheep and goats and make cotton your surplus, but after you grow on the farm all you need for the farm, then grow all the cotton you can. 


