Columbia, November 23.—We have had the most delightful and balmy weather for the past several weeks that I have ever known.

The prices of fertilizers are rising. So are all other prices. A big cotton crop will be sold at a low price and cheap cotton with everything else dear will mean ruin for the South in 1900.

This is very true and a matter which should be impressed often upon our farmers and one we sincerely hope they will take heed to and profit by.

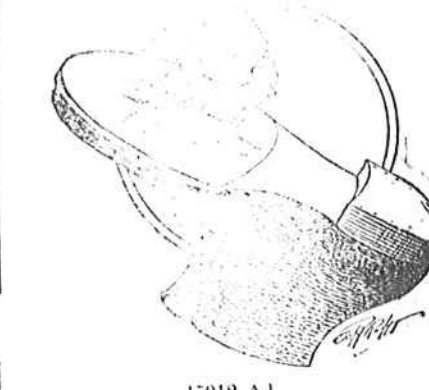
