A Lively Debate-Methods of Collecting the Book Concorn Claim Denounced. Next Meeting of Conference at Chester.

Orangeburg, S. C., December 11.-The peace and harmony that have characterized this session of the conference ended this morning when the Rev. W. R. Richardson, of Columbia, offered a resolution condemning the actions of Barbie & Smith in collecting \$288,000 from the United States government for the book con-


