WHERE THE METHODISTS GO.

APPOINTMENTS OF PREACHERS ANNOUNCED MONDAY.

A Lively Debate—Methods of Collecting the Book Concerns. Chairman Denounced. Next Meeting of Conference at Chester.

(Special to Greenville News.)

Orangeburg, S. C., December 11.—The peace and harmony that have characterized this session of the conference ended this morning when the Rev. W. R. Richardson, of Columbia, offered a resolution condemning the actions of Barbic & Smith in collecting \$288,000 from the United States government for the book concern.

This provoked one of the warmest debates ever heard on the floor of any session of the conference. The resolutions were adopted by a majority of twenty six votes.

The Rev. J. E. Grier asked the privilege of entertaining the next session of the annual conference at Chester, S. C. By a unanimous vote was decided to take the conference next to Chester. The appointments are as follows:

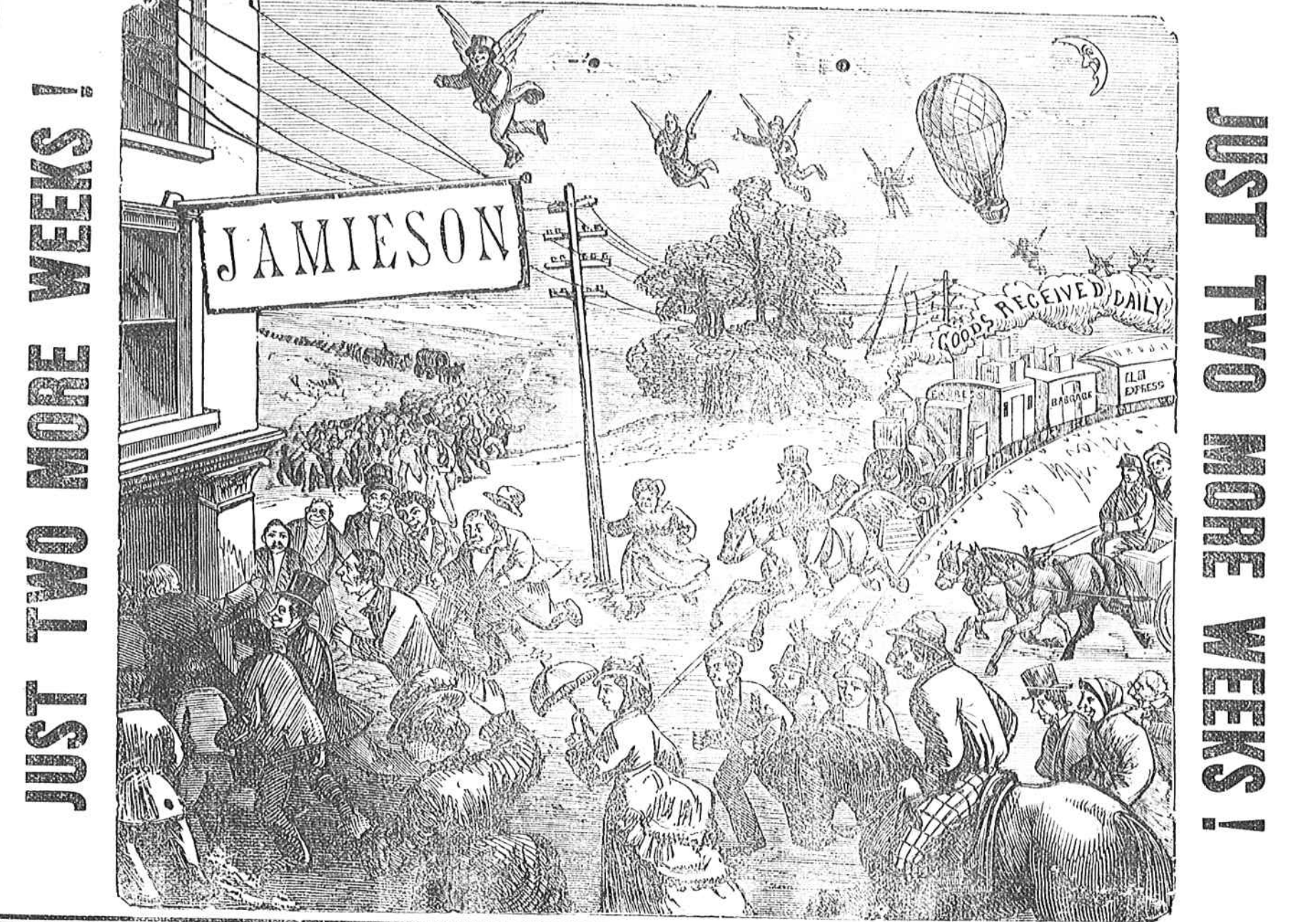
