THE COMING ECLIPSE.

A Total Eclipse of the Sun in May-New berry Should Have an Observatory

Mr. EDITOR: On the 28th day of May, 1900, there will be a total celipse of the sun. This phenomena will not occur here again in eight cen years, and the center line of totality may not cross Newberry county again in a generation or two. The strip of totality will be about 55 miles and the center line of totality is just below the corporate imits of Newberry.

eific Ocean just west of Mexico at sunrise, and will be visible at stations located within a narrow band, about 55 miles wide, that stretches from that point eastward over Mexico and the Gulf of Mexico and enters the United States near New Orleans, whence it passes north-ea tward toward Norfork and Cape Henry and crosses the Atlantic Ocean, Portugal and Alzeries and terminates near the northern end of the Red Sea at sun set. There will be a great many visiting Astromomers, and as Newberry is so near the center of the line, would it not be well for the authorities and business men of Newberry to correspond with Prof. F. H. Bigelaw and Prof. D. P. Todd, of Washington, D. C., and try to get one of the observations located at Newber-

I suppose Prof. Eigelaw's last bulle-Alabama had the larger average of clear sky in the last three years and South Carolina next. Then the eclipse comes earlier in the first named states, which is in South Carolina's favor. Newberry's railroads are convenient to bring in the heavy baggage and Newberry hotels could take care of the Astronomers. I am willing to do all in my power to get the Astronomers interested in Newberry. What do the good people of Newberry say about the natter. I kept the state of the sky from the 15th of May to the 15th of June for three years, and as I think my eport puts us on the iligible list I hope Newberry will try and get the Astron omers to come to Newberry.
