THE PROSPERITY FIRE.

A Small Cotton Fire—The C. N. & L. Depot But the Flames Were Extinguished.

Wednesday morning about 11:30 o'clock a telephone message was received here that a cotton fire was in progress at Prosperity, and for awhile there was considerable excitement among our citizens.

There were on the platform of the C. N. & L. depot about 65 bales of cotton, which was discovered to be on fire, which is thought caught from a spark from the engine of a passing train.

At one time the depot itself caught and it had the appearance of a serious fire, but the flames were extinguished with but little damage to the building.

Of the 65 bales of cotton on the platform 47 of them were more or less damaged. They were hauled a mile from town and rolled into a creek, which kept it from being a complete loss.

The cotton had been bought at that market by Mr. O. Melt. Holmes and had been delivered to the railroad authorities for shipment.

Prof. Wallace's History

Prof. W. E. Mikell, of the University of Pennsylvania, contributes to the Annals of the American Academy of Political and Social Science, a review of Prof. D. D. Wallace's Constitutional History of South Carolina, from which we make the following extract:

"Prof. Wallace's Constitutional History of South Carolina from 1725 to 1875 forms the first part of a history of that State from 1725 to 1810. The volume deals with the constitution of the colony under the Royal Government; with the Stamp Act; the relations of the Commons and Council; the appropriation of the public money; and the attempt of the Commons to abolish the legislative character of the Council. It therefore will be seen that the author has merely blazed his path; the constructive work is yet to be done.

"Mr. Wallace has undertaken a task the successful accomplishment of which will be welcomed by all who are interested in South Carolina, and in the constitutional history of our States generally; he has brought to bear on this task an evident love of his subject, and commendable industry in his search for facts."
