GOEBEL DIED SATURDAY NIGHT.

BEGAN TO SINK IN THE AFTERNOON AND NEVER CALLED.

Fight Goes On—Both Sides Appeal To the Court—Washington Thinks Taylor Must Submit.

Frankfort, Ky., Feb. 3.—Senator Goebel died this evening at 7:37 o'clock. Early in the afternoon it was seen that death was only a matter of a short time. Judge Pryor wired Judge Redwine at 3:39 o'clock that he could not live an hour and that there was no earthly hope. Justus Goebel, the senator's brother, arrived in the afternoon. He came out of the chamber later weeping bitterly.

Goebel suffered a relapse shortly after 1 o'clock, and did not respond to the remedies failing to rally. His stomach was the great trouble. The morning he was shot he was sick at his hotel and went to the State house without breakfast. He has had practically no nourishment since.

Judge Cantrell issued an injunction today against Taylor and General Collier. A hearing on a motion to make the injunction permanent will be had before Judge Cantrell on the 8th at Georgetown. If the democratic legislators are refused admission to the State house on Monday, Taylor and Collier will be considered in contempt of court. The democrats will come back to Frankfort on Monday. The republicans will assemble at London. No effort will be made to secure personal service on Taylor. The Judge directed that his order be allowed to remain binding without service because of the danger threatening any one who should undertake the task and the results that might ensue owing to the state of the public mind.

Speaker Trimble said today the democratic legislators will not obey any orders issued by Taylor and would not go to London. Beckham, democratic lieutenant governor, is acting as governor.

Having been refused help from the federal government, Governor Taylor has decided to appeal to the federal courts. He will today ask Judge Evans to issue a writ of injunction restraining Goebel from acting as governor. This course was decided upon here early this morning at a conference of republican attorneys. Ex-Governor Bradley will probably lead the argument before Judge Evans for the desired writ. It is expected that the petition will contain these chief points:

Taylor undoubtedly had the majority of votes in the late election; that his political opponents officially called upon to pass on said election so decided. Any attempt of the democratic legislature to unseat him will be an usurpation of power and unconstitutional.

The declaration of Goebel's election made by the democratic legislators is void as Taylor had adjourned the legislature and legislation in the interim was illegal. He will claim that he had the power to adjourn the legislature as he deemed an insurrection existed and he alone was governor and judge of whether said insurrection existed.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 3.—The refusal of the administration to respond to Taylor's appeal for recognition is said by members of the cabinet to mean that Taylor will probably be unseated. The president and cabinet regret this as they are convinced that Taylor was elected rightfully and the action of the Goebel board of control and the Goebel legislature in declaring Goebel elected was improper, but they realize that thus far the Kentucky legislature has acted within its right under the law, and that interference by the federal authority would be wrong.

Senator Lindsay has assured the administration that the legislature will proceed under the Goebel law, and there is nothing for the government to do but submit.
