"I have read a brief extract from his speech," said Mr. Bryan. "It is true that I favored the ratification of the treaty, but I stated in my interview, published by the Associated Press on December 24, four days after the treaty was signed, and nearly two months before it was ratified, that, in my judgment, we should not only ratify the treaty, but that we should declare the nation's purpose to give the Filipinos independence upon the same terms men of Columbia made no effort to that independence was promised the Cubans. This opinion was reiterated time and again.

"The Bacon resolution made the promise of independence. Mr. Tillman said: "I have felt indignant at the treatment I received from the Senator (Morgan). Never in my experience in the Senate have I been treated so discourteously by a membeof the Senate."

Mr. Morgan endeavored to interrupt Mr. Tillman, but the latter waved h'm aside, saying, "I decline to yield to the Senator. He has put himsel! outside the pale of courtesy and considerations so far as I am concerned."

He then explatued the circumstances of Mr. Morgan's refusal to permit him to reply to M . Wolcott.

"When I rose to explain the situation in South Carolina as it was presented by the Senator from colorado," said Mr. Tillman, the Senator from A'abama said: 'No, I cannot permit you to speak now. I'll leave you to fight it out some other time.' It was the first time in my experience that I bad ever been refused a hearing in like circumstances. No Republican would have denied me the privilege because there is no man on that side of the chamber so lacking

Mr. Tillman then explained der the present constitution of South Carolina there were about 114,000 regisistered voters, 14,000 of whom were colored. N'nety-nine per cent. of the white vote in the State, be said, was Democratic. In the summer primaries fully 90 per cent. of the registered votes were cast. At these primaries the contests for the State offices were made.

"There is no leanargy in the politics of South Carolica," said Mr. Tillman. We have as much politics to the square mile as any State in the Union. There is no Republican party in the State. The Republican machine is composed of Federal office-holders who control of the patronage and send the Republican national conventions."

"The elections in November are simply ratifications of the primaries. Naturally the result being a foregone conclusion only 4,000 or 5,000 voters turn out in each district to vote."

The whites of the South are patriotic Americans.
