The State convention last week was harmonious and without incident. The opposition of Col. L. W. Yomans to the adoption of the resolutions endorsing Senator Tillman had no response in the convention. Opposition at this time to the re-election of Senator Tillman can result in no good and I hope he will have no opposition. He has made an active member in the Senate and I believe represents a large majority of the people of the State on all of the important questions that are now before that body and he will be re-elected by an overwhelming majority it matters not who opposes him. TO SEE THE ECLIPSE. All Visitors will by Cordially Welcomed-The One Chance in a Life Time-Newberry

Newberry College and the town of Newberry cordially invite all who wish to view the coming eclipse from the best position, and under the most favorable ci c instances, to come to Newberry on the (8th. All are assured of a warm re-

ception and a most hearty welcome. will not occur again in this section within a century, and if we fail to see this one it is probable that we shall never see one. It is true that a partial eclipse is predieted for 1918, but that is a different thing from a total eclipse, and even that is 18 years off. Let our people lay aside their business for a couple hours Monday morning, and take time to observe this rare and wonderful phenomena; it will

well repay them for their trouble. The eclipse will commence here about quarter after seven o'clock, and will last till about half past nine. The period of total celipse will be about half past eight, and will last one minute and thirty-four seconds.

To those who are seeking a favorable place-from which to view the eclipse, we would suggest that there is not a better place anywhere than Newberry. Situated on ground at least as high as the Little Mountain, she is right within the middle of the belt of totality-perhaps not more

than a mile from its exact centre. There will be at least two parties of visiting astronomers here with their instruments. The first of these will consist of Prof. Frank II. Bigelow, of the signal service at Washington; Prof. Cleveland Abbe, of the weather bureau; Mr. Roberdeau Buchanan, of the nautical almanac office, who compiles eclipse data for the weather bureau, and Prof. Page, meteorologist of the United States hydrographic office. Prof. Bigelow arrived in the city Wednesday, and has already selected the location for his instrumenta

The other party, who are representatives of the Brooklyn, (N. Y.;) Astronomi cal Association, and are headed by Prof. Garrett P. Serviss, a noted astronomer, will get here tomorrow, and will at once select a site from which to take their ob-

On Saturday night there will be two lectures, (free) in the opera house, by the government astronomers. One by Prof. Bigelow on "Observation of Eclipses," using lantern and slides; the other by Prof. Abbe, on "The Past, Pres-


