yard on Monday morning with renewed energy, and I tried to show Mr. Pool my appreciation of his goodness to me by truly spreading myself, and on the following Saturday, when we had come to the same place for our week's pay, and I being the only white laborer in the crowd, after Mr. Tench had finished paying the darkeys the noble old gentleman said: "Tench, this boy is worth more than we paid last week; give him cause he could not come forward with \$1.50 per day." I could not suppress my feelings, and had to turn my head for a moment to keep him from seeing the tear-drops in my eyes. And went back to the brick yard the next Monday morning, again with renewed

On the Wednesday following the no ble old gentleman came driving out to the yard, and he came straight to me and said: "John, get in my buggy and go and put on the best clothes you have got, and come back here to me." went, and I could not imagine what on earth was the matter. I was so afraid had done something that had displeased him. But when I got back he nade all my anxiety turn to joy by telling me to take charge of the yard-he was going to the Greenville fair and he wanted me to boss his hands for him. God bless the good old man. It was he who started me in life when I needed a friend, and for twenty long years he was indeed my best friend.

When the time of year came for his brick yard to close, he elected me Chief of Police of Newberry, which position held eight years, and although honor and respect all the different Mayors that I served under, yet Mr. Pool was, the whole time, my friend and adviser. I remember, on one occasion, when some desperadoes tried to take the town, and after a hard struggle I succeeded in getting them safely locked up in the guardhouse, my good old friend drove up to where a large crowd had collected on the street and called me out to his buggy and said: "My boy, I am so glad that you have shown the people of Newberry that you are a man." And all through life Mr. Pool has been my adviser and friend, and while I appreciate all of my friends, today Mr. Pool stands first in my heart because he was a true friend when a young man needed one most.

And when I was appointed Magistrate, again the old gentleman showed and having me called out, and with a warm grasp of the hand and tears showing in his eyes, said; "My boy, am so glad you got the appointment. know you will do your duty," and he drove off. How few people who are in good circumstances will notice and help a poor boy! May no mist of sorrow ever gather around those he loved, is my prayer. I know that one of my best friends has gone, and Newberry has lost one of the best men that ever lived. I mourn with those that mourn.


