Executive Committee Meeting.

A COUNTY CONVENTION CALLED FOR JULY 9 TO ADMIT NEW CLUBS.

County Board of Control, County Dispenser and County Sub-Superintendents Thrown into the Primary—The County Campaign Arranged for. Other Matters.

The County Democratic Executive Committee met in the Court House on Saturday and transacted considerable business.

Twenty-eight of the thirty-eight clubs in the county were represented at the meeting.

County Chairman Bedenburgh presided at the meeting and in calling the meeting to order stated that at the last meeting of the Committee it was decided to vote for Magistrates by townships, and it so happened that a great many voters in the county lived in one township and belonged to a club in another, and under that decision it was the opinion of some that a voter would have to vote in the township in which he lived, and in order to do this new clubs would have to be organized. He also stated that he had petitions or requests from persons in the county asking that they be allowed to organize a new club, and it would be necessary for a county convention to admit them.

After considerable discussion the following resolution, offered by Mr. J. C. Chalmers, was adopted:

Resolved, That a County Convention be called to meet on Monday, the 9th day of July, 1900, to admit new clubs and to transact any other business that may come before it; that the clubs be called to meet on Saturday, July 7th; and that clubs that have not reorganized meet the same day and reorganize, elect delegates to the County Convention and a member of the County Democratic Executive Committee.

Mr. J. Fred Schumpert moved that the action of the Committee at its last meeting relative to the election of Magistrates by townships, be rescinded.

Mr. J. C. Chalmers moved to lay Mr. Schumpert's motion on the table, which the Committee refused to do by a vote of 13 to 12, as follows:

The original motion was then adopted by acclamation.

Mr. J. L. Keitt then offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That Magistrates of Newberry County shall be nominated by the primary election by the Democratic clubs of each judicial district voting for candidates within its territory, and that each member of the clubs within said districts or townships shall be entitled to vote for said Magistrate of that district.

Mr. J. W. D. Johnson moved that the County Board of Control and County Dispenser be nominated by the primary plan. This motion received a second, and Messrs. Johnson, J. P. Banks, R. T. C. Hunter and others spoke in its favor.

Mr. W. C. Sligh added as an amendment to the motion that Sub-Commissioners of the County be included, and it was accepted.

Mr. J. A. Kinard moved to table the motion, a yeas and nay vote was called for and the motion to table was lost by a vote of 16 to 11, as follows:

The original vote was then put and adopted by a rising vote of 17 to 7.

Mr. J. C. Chalmers then offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Supervisors of Registration for the County be nominated by the primary.

Mr. W. C. Sligh moved to table the motion, which the Committee did by a vote of 14 to 8, as follows:

Mr. W. G. Peterson offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That all candidates pay to Treasurer of the Executive Committee the amount of their assessments before the first campaign meeting, and that any candidate who fails to pay his assessment by that time, the votes cast for him shall not be counted.

The assessment for candidates for County Dispenser was fixed at \$4. Candidates for members of Board of Control and County Commissioners were not assessed.

On motion, the following committee was appointed to arrange a schedule for the county campaign: W. P. Housel, J. C. Chalmers, J. L. Keitt, J. F. Banks and H. T. Long. The committee reported as follows and the schedule was adopted:

The County Chairman was authorized to change the date of either of the campaign meetings in case they should happen to conflict with the County Farmers' Institute.

STATE CAMPAIGN COMMITTEE.

The following Committee of Arrangements was appointed for the State campaign meeting at Newberry: County Chairman A. E. P. Bedenburgh, Com. J. Fred Schumpert, Jno. B. Fellers, M. L. Spearmen and Jacob Senn.

The Committee adjourned to meet on July 9th, immediately after the County Convention adjourns.

SQUEUNK OF GUAYASQUEAN LOCATED.

Will be Captured in all Probability Today and put on Exhibition Here.

On Wednesday of last week some of the young men of Ruben section were out hunting and came across a peculiar animal in the swamp on Second creek. From the description given it was something like an American Hon—being shaggy about the head and shoulders while the hinder portion was close haired—the front part being some six or eight inches higher than the rear. This strange animal has been ravaging the turkey and goose property of the citizens—destroying in some instances whole flocks of same. When aroused from its lair it bounded away with tremendous leaps and soon distanced all pursuit; fortunately, however, it was unable to take one of its progeny along in its flight, and it was captured, and is now in possession of Mr. J. W. Sauer. It is a remarkably beautiful animal, resembling more than anything else, a great fluffy puppy, and would be pronounced at first sight a dog; but on closer observation one is constrained to change his opinion; its head is broad and heavy, eyes close together and peculiarly bright and black; the head and shoulders are covered with long silky hair, whilst from the shoulders back the fleece is equal to that of the finest Merino or Southdown sheep. When first handled it would only curl up and emit a growl, showing its fangs—for all the world like an opossum; but it very soon became gentle and follows Mr. Sauer around the place. It is utterly devoid of fear, and after a lot of trouble and care has been taken to take a little sweet milk for nourishment. Mr. S. in order to keep it alive, had to kill several chickens, which it devoured ravenously.

The little fellow is a beautiful white and black spotted animal. Mr. S. will take him to Newberry in a few days to let him be seen.
