A COUNTY CONVENTION CALLED FOR JULY 9 TO ADMIT NEW CLUBS.

The County Democratic Executive Committee met in the Court House on Saturday and transacted considerable business.

Twenty-eight of the thirty-eight clubin the county were represented at the

County Chairman Bedenbaugh preided at the meeting and in calling the meeting to order stated that at the last meeting of the Committee it was deeided to vote for Magistrates by townships, and it so happened that a great many voters in the county lived in one ownship and belonged to a cleb in another, and under that decision it was he opinion of some that a voter would have to vote in the township in which ne lived, and in order to do this new dubs would have to be organized. He dso stated that he had petitions or rejuests from persons in the county askng that they be allowed to organize a new club, and it would be necessary for county convention to admit them.

After considerable discussion the following lowing resolution, offered by Mr. J. C. halmers, was adopted:

Resolved, That a County Convention be called to meet on Monday, the 9th day of July, 1900, to admit new clubs and to transact any other business that cay come before it: that the clubs la elled to meet on Saturday, July 7tl od that clubs that have not reorgaed meet the same day and reorganize ect delegates to the County Convenon and a member of the County Dem peratic Executive Committee.


