

# The Herald and News.

In 1855 Thos. P. Slider began the publication of the Rising Sun and later Thos. F. Grenaker was associated with him. Mr. Slider sold his interest to R. H. Grenaker. The paper was published for a while as a tri-weekly and the name changed to the Newberry Herald, and it was published as a weekly by T. F. and R. H. Grenaker until 1875, when the latter withdrew, Mr. T. F. Grenaker continuing the publication until 1885, when it passed into the hands of A. C. Jones, and in 1887 E. H. Aull and W. P. Houseal became the owners, and in 1894 Mr. Houseal withdrew, and it is now published by E. H. Aull. In 1884 the News, which had been established in 1878 by R. H. Grenaker, Jr., and W. P. Houseal, was merged with the Herald, and the paper has been known since as the Herald and News. It has been edited at various times by Ira B. Jones, W. H. Wallace, G. B. Cromer, G. G. Sale and the present proprietor. The News was edited at various times by R. H. Grenaker, Jr., Jno. A. Chapman, M. L. Bonham, L. W. Simkins, G. G. Sale and E. H. Aull.

One of the latest additions to the office is a complete bindery, which enables the office to turn out work that would be creditable to some of the metropolitan job offices.

The Herald and News is edited by Mr. E. H. Aull, Pres. of the E. H. Aull Co., and the policy of the

paper has always been conservative.

Mr. L. B. Aull, brother of the editor, is the business manager, and Mr. J. W. Earhardt has charge of the local department.
