CHARLESTON'S VOICE FOR MSWENEY.

In the News and Courier of yesterday we find the following editorial...

A great ado is being raised by the friends, or rather we should say the supporters, of Gov. Hoyt in his candidacy for the Governorship because of the large vote which Charleston gave to Governor McSweney, and which they fear will be even larger at the second primary.

The fact is that there are no candidates for Governor, not one of whom, on the state paper, proposed Charleston anything for her special interests.

The most important thing for the state to do on Tuesday is to turn out and vote. Don't fail to go to the polls and vote, taking it for granted that the majority favor will be a matter of course.

The city of Charleston is certainly coming to the front as a power in the state. It has shown its strength in the past by its support of the State's best for Charleston.

Whitman was a very distinguished possibility. Gary and Patterson were both of them. It was a very interesting contest.

There is a majority in Charleston against the dispensary, but there is a smaller majority against prohibition. In this case the prohibition candidate could promise no relief from the dispensary even in the future.

As to the absurd threat to the anonymous individual, who wrote to the News and Courier as well as to other papers, that our vote would hurt our expression, it is sufficient to say, that the anti-prohibitionists are in a large majority in the Legislature, and that we do not believe the people who are expected to contribute to the expenditure are going to hurt themselves and the State in order to punish the people of Charleston for exercising the freedom of the press.

Of course, we do not know how the city will vote in the second primary, but we believe it will give nearly as large a vote for McSweney, as the combined vote of McSweney, Gary, Patterson and Whitman at the first primary, provided, of course, that a large total vote is cast. We think the whole prohibition vote of the city went to Hoyt in the first primary and perhaps also the votes of a few that thought prohibition would help to pull down the dispensary.

A new afternoon paper has made its appearance in Spartanburg. It is a four page paper, taking press dispatches and is edited by Mr. Chas. H. Henry, an experienced newspaper man.

Capt. C. C. Little, formerly Assistant Superintendent of the C. N. & L. Railroad, and who is prominently known in Newberry, died in Columbia on Wednesday.

THREATENING BOYCOTTS.

A few years ago threats of boycotts were frequently heard on account of political opinions, and nothing was condemned more severely than that idea by certain papers in this State.

What do we see to-day—certain correspondents, and we believe one or two newspapers threatening the city of Charleston with a boycott of the exposition on account of that city's vote for Governor McSweney.

What have those papers said of so bitterly condemned the Alliance and the farmers a few years ago for threatening to boycott newspapers and newspapers for having the backbone to assert their political rights to say that the city of Charleston, on the ground that other local citizens, namely, the privilege of starting her hands for whom she pleased.

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ENDORSED BY A MINISTER.

Rev. S. H. Brown, formerly of the Administration of Gov. McSweney, and says the merits of the election.

Rev. S. H. Brown, one of the oldest and most respected ministers of the Methodist church in this State, and pastor of the Christian Neighbor, endorsed the administration of Gov. McSweney, and says his endorsement has been successful and should be endorsed by his election.

The following editorial appeared in the Christian Neighbor this week: "During the campaign in this State the editor of the Neighbor has refrained from expressing a choice between the leading gubernatorial candidates because of friendliness towards both, and because he does not believe that true temperance and morality will be materially helped or hurt by either Prohibition or Dispensary.

Legislation and the execution of laws cannot take the place of intelligent and conscientious conviction on the liquor question. "Moral sanction," we believe, is the only effective way of promoting genuine temperance.

Holding these opinions, and without the least disparagement of Gov. Hoyt, the Prohibition candidate for his able and clear mind, we think Governor McSweney's administration has been successful and that a moral endorsement, as to all the commendation caused by Senator Tillman's "moral alliance" charge, it has not established. The attractiveness of any man of high or low condition, furnished no ground for abandoning one's principles, nor is it wise to allow indignation to be an opponent's words or acts to swerve from a stand.
