Twenty thousand sheep are re ported lost in one county of Montana in an October blizzard and twenty herders are frozen to death. Inci dents of this kind are reported every winter. Yet in the monatains of North and South Carolina there are tens of thousands of acres of waste bought for from 50 cents to \$3 an acre and on which sheep would thrive a thrifty grass would yield splendid returns in sheep-better than go'd mines or even cotton mills There are no killing blizzards or withering droughts or spells of burning heat. This is an idea! sheep country and while the mountain lands are cheap is the time for purchasers to make fortunes by buying an using them

The experiments the secretary of agriculture is conducting with grasses at Belton should be of vast use in this connection. The land in the mountains, especially in the coves, brings fine yields of native grasses which are never entirely killed in winter, but the Belton experiments are likely to show which grasses will do best in our soil and climate.—Ex

We think the extract above was taken from the Greenville News of possibly a year or more ago, but it is good yet, and is not hart by age. We believe that sheep raising con'd be made profitable in our mountain section, and that even here in Newberry the industry might and could be made to pay. Our people should get out of the notion, for it is only a notion, that there is no money in anything except cotton. A good cattle and sheep farm could be conducted on many hillsides and along the canebrakes of our rivers and made more profitable than many of our cotton farms. Why not try it? We know it would pay in the moun tain section of the State. Diversi fied industries are the things we need. Not all cotton, nor all corn or wheat or oats, and neither do we want all stock and cattle farms.


