NEWBERRY FILES CLAIM

For \$1,500 Expended in Stamping Out Smallpox.

Florence, May 3.—A very interesting question was raised before Dr. James Evans, secretary of the State board of health, last night, as to whether or not the State board is responsible for expenses incurred in stamping out smallpox in cities, as well as rural districts.

Attorney General Bellinger is said to have decided that towns are as much entitled to the use of \$15,000 appropriation for such purposes as are the country districts.

A delegation from Newberry, consisting of Mr. E. H. Aull, private secretary to Gov. McSweney; Dr. E. C. Jones and Mayor O. Klettner were closeted with Dr. James Evans for several hours. They presented claims for \$1,500, which was used in stamping out smallpox in the city of Newberry. While he recognized the equity of the claim, Dr. Evans told the delegation that he could not refund the money, as the State board did not have the money to pay, and as they interpreted the law, were not responsible. It is likely that the matter will be brought before the whole board.

Dr. Evans says the rural districts will use the \$15,000 appropriation. Columbia has expended about \$7,000 on smallpox troubles; Sumter \$3,500; Florence about the same amount, and other cities in proportion. If Newberry's claims are valid, why not possible claims from other towns.—The State.

ANNUAL MEETING

JAMES D. NANCE CAMP

Met Yesterday at Court House and Transacted Business of Importance—Southern Railway Adopted as Official Route for Reunion at Columbia.

At the regular meeting of the James D. Nance Camp held yesterday at the Court House, Lt. Commander R. C. Carlisle presided in the absence of Commander J. W. Gary.

The minutes of last meeting were read and sustained. Four new members were enrolled as follows: J. H. P. Cromer, W. E. Rutherford, Alex C. Welch and J. W. L. Arthur.

There was no member of the committee which was appointed to draft suitable resolutions on the death of Col. Hunt present. They were requested to report at the next meeting.

A committee consisting of the following gentlemen was appointed to ascertain how many members of the camp had died and not been reported, and to draft suitable resolutions on the same.

Col. Schumpert, chairman of the memorial committee, stated that all arrangements had been made and the program for Memorial Day, which was fixed for May 14th instead of the 10th, many of the old soldiers being absent on that day attending the State reunion in Columbia.

It was moved and carried that the Southern Railway be the official route to convey the veterans to Columbia. A special train will leave Newberry at 8:15 Wednesday morning. The veterans will go on this train.

The commander was requested to appoint a sponsor and two aides of honor to represent the camp at the Memphis reunion. He was given a few days in which to make his appointments.

The Adjutant was given the power to appoint four delegates and four alternates to the Memphis reunion.

As there was no further business to transact the camp adjourned.

MEMORIAL DAY.

Will Be Observed Tuesday, 14th May This Year With Fitting Exercises—In Testing Program—Committees Appointed.

Memorial day this year has been postponed from the 10th of May until next Tuesday, the 14th, as the former date conflicted with the State reunion of Confederate veterans in Columbia and the desire to have as many of the old soldiers present as possible caused the change.

There is an act of the legislature setting a day apart on which to honor the Confederate dead, but this is not necessary as the memory of those who fought so bravely for a cause just, though lost, will ever be sacredly honored by every true man.

The committees appointed from the James D. Nance Camp, U. C. V., and the John M. Kinard Camp, Sons of Veterans to select a speaker and appoint committees to decorate opera house, monument and cemeteries for memorial day have completed their work.

Judge Y. J. Pope was invited to deliver the address and has accepted invitation.
