Chairman Carlisle Issues a Circular Letter to You on a County Exhibit for Newberry County.

Mr. M. A. Carlisle Chairman of the Newberry County Commissioners for the Charleston exposition published in the Observer of yesterday the following to the farmers of this county: To the Farmers of Newberry County: As chairman of the Charleston exposition, I take this means of calling upon you to begin the preparation of farm products for exhibit at Charleston. The exposition opens on December 1, 1901. All farm products included in the county exhibits will be shipped free.

The wheat and oat crops now being harvested should receive your attention. It is the interest of every progressive farmer to make an exhibit of these crops. Select now a dozen sheaves of your wheat and oats in one or more bushel lots. Also select a dozen sheaves or bundles of the best of each and preserve them in as good condition as you can.

See your township commissioner and have him to assist you, and notify me that you will take or have already taken steps to get up the exhibit. A room will be prepared at Newberry for the collection of all exhibits.

The farmers are also urged to make preparations to make exhibits of all other crops, especially corn, tobacco, rice and potatoes. Send me your names and also state what you expect to exhibit.

I call upon the township commissioners to render me assistance in this matter. Their names and townships are:

PRESIDENT CROMER AT WOFFORD.

Talks to the Boys About the Man and the Mass.

We copy the following article from the Spartanburg Journal of the 1-3 Inst. on President Geo. B. Cromer's address before the literary societies of Wofford College: "This morning at 11 o'clock the annual address to the Calhoun and Preston literary societies was delivered by Geo. B. Cromer, president of Newberry College. Meri Morrison and G. A. Bennett, the respective presidents of the societies, jointly presided over the occasion.

"Mr. Cromer stated that he was scarcely strong enough to spend this morning and were it not for his high appreciation of the honor conferred on him he would not have attempted it. After a few witty remarks as to the first personal pronoun, he announced as his subject, "The Man and the Mass."

The speaker was evidently no advocate of the specialization tendency so marked in college and industrial life. A rising freshman was not competent to decide upon his future profession. The aim of education should be to produce a well-rounded man.

"The crowd is the individuals who compose it. Every man in the crowd acting with the crowd and encouraging it is responsible for its deeds. You cannot divide the responsibility. Take care of the individuals and the community will take care of itself. In spite of the party lash and party spirit so evident now, morals are better than methods because men are better than machines. The man dare not disregard his responsibility as an individual when acting for the State. He cannot escape his obligation to society.

"True education is social and ethical, not merely for business success. True progress is something more than the hum of spindles and the clack of looms. It remains for our colleges to show that there are untold values beyond college dollars and cents. He urged the college men to go out and lend a hand to help their fellow-men.

Mr. Cromer spoke entirely without notes and his address was thoughtful, impressive and scholarly. In every way it was worthy of the occasion and deserves to rank with the best that the city has heard."

Alabama's New Governor.

Montgomery, Ala., June 12.—Hon. Wm. D. Jelks of Barbour county, succeeds Gov. W. J. Samford, who died last night. Mr. Jelks, who is president of the senate, is now absent in Beaumont, Texas, but a telegram was received from him today stating that he would reach the city tomorrow to assume the duties of office. Gov. Jelks will hold office until the regular election, in 1902, and his successor is elected and qualified.

Pending the arrival of Governor-elect Jelks, Hon. Alfred M. Turnball, of Hale, speaker pro tem. of the house, is acting governor. Speaker Fetters, of the house, died a few months ago.

Out of respect to the governor the constitutional convention adjourned until tomorrow at 10 o'clock.

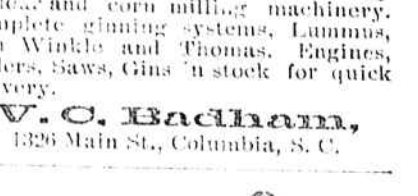
