KILLED WITH A HOE.

One Negro Kills Another on Mr. J. C. S. Brown's Place About Eight Miles From Town—The Coroner's Inquest.

On last Tuesday Lee Glymph struck Adam Chick in the head with a hoe, causing trepanation of the brain, from which Chick died. Both were negroes and were working for Mr. Brown when the difficulty occurred.

It seems that about 9 o'clock in the morning while both were in the Mr. Brown's field hoeing corn some little dispute arose, which developed into a quarrel. It is not known that there was any ill feeling between them before this time. Chick died about 5 o'clock the same afternoon.

As soon as the fatal blow was struck Glymph fled and hid at large. Warrants are out for him and it is probable that he will be captured within the next few days.

Mr. Brown's plantation, where the killing occurred is in the Caldwell township about 8 miles from town. Coroner Lindsay went up on Wednesday morning and held the inquest over the body. Mr. J. C. S. Brown acted as foreman of the jury. Only one witness was examined, Mr. J. M. Brown, who heard part of the quarrel, and was about twenty yards away from the negroes when the blow was struck.

The following is the testimony and verdict of the coroner's inquest:

TESTIMONY. J. M. Brown, sworn, says: I was at home yesterday. I live in Newberry County. Lee Glymph and Adam Chick were fussing yesterday, July 9, 1901. Lee told Adam to hush and Adam said, you can't make me hush. Then I told both of them if they would run their hands as well as they did their mouths I would get more work done. Then Adam told me that Lee had told him that he was going to make him hush and that he wasn't going to do it. Then we went on and hood corn on and I was off from them about twenty yards and I never heard any more until I heard the liek. I looked around and Adam was down. He was lying straight on his back. I don't suppose it was more than ten minutes from the time they were fussing until when the liek was struck. After Lee hit the liek he walked around Adam and myself about three times. I told him that he had killed Adam. He never made any reply. Then Lee left. Lee cursed Adam once. He said, "Damn it, I will whip you." They had no falling out before that I know of. Adam told Lee that he could try it if he wanted to. Adam made no threats to Lee what he was going to do.

J. M. Brown. J. M. Brown recalled: The instrument used was eye hoe.

THE VERDICT. The jury returned the following verdict: STATE OF SOUTH CAROLINA, COUNTY OF NEWBERRY.

An inquisition indented taken at J. C. S. Brown's place, in the county and State aforesaid, the 10th day of July, 1901, before F. M. Lindsay, coroner, upon view of the body of Adam Chick, of Newberry County, then and there being dead, by the oaths of J. C. S. Brown, W. H. Wendt, S. J. Cromer, E. C. Cromer, Sims G. Brown, William Sanders, George Brooks, Andrew Cromer, Spence Caldwell, Milton Marshall, Reubin Rutherford, Sims Walker, being a lawful jury of inquest, who, being charged and sworn to inquire for the State of South Carolina where and by what means the said Adam Chick came to his death, upon their oaths do say that the said Adam Chick came to his death by a wound inflicted with a hoe in the hand of Lee Glymph on July 9, 1901, from which wound the said Adam Chick died in the county and State aforesaid July 9, 1901.

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WOMAN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

Annual State Meeting to be Opened in Central Methodist Church Wednesday Evening at 8:30 o'clock—A Large Attendance Expected.

The twenty-third annual meeting of the Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary Society of the South Carolina conference will be called to order in Central Methodist church on Wednesday evening at 8:30 o'clock. This conference society was organized in the Methodist church here during the meeting of the annual conference which was held in this town, and in the Baptist church in 1878. Bishop Wightman presided at that annual conference. Providence permitting, Mrs. M. D. Wightman, who for years has been president of the Woman's Missionary Society, will preside at the meeting next week.

This is not a small body. The committee on entertainment has received notice of the appointment of between 90 and 100 delegates, and the roll is increased by each mail.

Several very prominent missionary workers from outside the State are expected. Miss Emma Gary, of Georgia, who is at home for a while from her work in China, will be here. Several young ladies who are looking forward to missionary work will be present also.

Dr. J. W. Tarboeck, of Brazil, is expected, and Dr. John A. Rice, missionary secretary of the South Carolina conference, has promised to be here.
