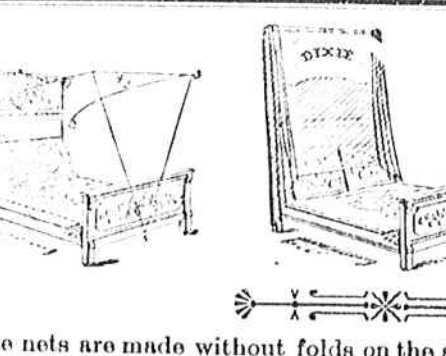
Four trustees will be elected at this meeting.

FIVE REASONS WHY YOU SHOULD BUY THE DIXIE.

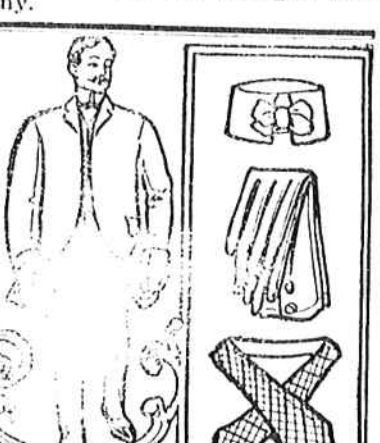
