Col. Willie Jones Withdraws.

IN WITHDRAWING FROM THE RACE HE PRESENTS GEN. HAMPTON'S NAME.

Would Have Had a Choice Senator—This Is the Place Should He Offered His Name and All Other Candidates Should Step Aside

[The State, 7th]

A statement was given in the press on Saturday by Col. Willie Jones, the chairman of the Democratic party in this State, who has been an avowed candidate for senatorial honors, which will set the people and the politicians of the State to thinking and talking. Col. Jones withdraws from the race, and in doing so makes the suggestion that the other candidates for Senator McLaurin's seat step aside also, and let the position be unanimously tendered to Gen. Wade Hampton, the most notable figure today in South Carolina's political and war history. It is a proposition that will startle many at the first, but its appropriateness and merits will be certain to command much consideration from the people of the State.

Here is what Col. Jones says of the matter in his statement:

"I have concluded not to enter the race for the United States Senate next year, because I feel that I can not give up my home business interests, unless there be a special demand for it. I have a very large personal acquaintance with the Democrats of this State. Judging from letters received and many personal interviews I feel satisfied that my chances for the nomination to this distinguished position would have been fully as good as that of any candidate whose name is now mentioned in connection with the senatorship. I would have no political fear to run against any man in the State except two, namely, Senator Tillman and Gen. Hampton, because I believe either of them would beat me or any other man in the State."

Coming as it does from the State chairman, the proposition is one that is of peculiar interest.

That it will meet with the unanimous approval of all veterans in South Carolina goes without saying, and there will be many who are not veterans who will approve of it. It is of course impossible to forecast the course the other candidates will pursue. One thing is certain, however, and that is that should Gen. Hampton, the man who redeemed the State from negro rule, be sent back to the senate the people of South Carolina would be represented on all the important issues by one who has ever been true to his people in time of war and in time of peace. To send him back as a crowning glory to a long and useful life would be a compliment, indeed an act that would show to the outside world that South Carolina appreciates a son who has done for her what nothing she can do for him can repay.

MARRIAGE OF ROOSEVELT'S PARENTS

A South Carolina Minister Performed the Ceremony.

The Greenwood correspondent of the News and Courier says:

"The Hon. D. C. Heyward, of Walterboro, who has been spending several days in the city, called attention yesterday to a fact that is worthy of note. He said that the Rev. J. B. Dunwoody, a Presbyterian minister, who is now living at Walterboro, officiated at the ceremony that made the parents of President Roosevelt husband and wife. Mr. Dunwoody is a cousin of the president's mother, who was a Miss Bullock, of Roswell, Ga., and on that account was asked to officiate at the marriage. The marriage took place at Roswell, Ga., in 1853. Mr. Dunwoody was quite a young man and had but recently entered the ministry. He is now about 75 years old and has retired from active work, but still preaches occasionally."

## ROOSEVELT'S PAY

He Received \$2,015.74 for the Last 15 Days in September.

Washington, Oct. 2.—A message was sent to the White House yesterday with a check for \$2,015.74 from his heir to President Roosevelt as his fixed salary for the last seventeen days of September. A similar check, but for the amount of \$1,850.88, will be forwarded to the estate of the late William McKinley.

"With at any reflection upon any candidate now in the field I believe that Gen. Hampton's views on national politics meet the approval of practically all the Democrats in the State. Such a happy and gracious event as the selection of Gen. Hampton at this particular time would make the Democratic party of this State absolutely irresistible and save us much agitation and feeling when there is so much else for our people to do."
