UP TO THE TOWN.

We have been informed by the commissioners to get up a Newberry county exhibit at the Charleston Exposition that they have done all that they could, and the exhibits have been secured and can be got together and loaded on the cars within ten days. But this will take some money, and money is what is now needed.

Some time ago the county commissioners appropriated \$300 on the part of the county for this purpose, but payment was made conditional upon the consent of the legislature. The exhibit commissioners inform us that they have seen a majority of the Newberry delegation and all seem so far to favor the consent of the legislature being given, and there is no doubt that it will be secured; but the county refuses to pay over the money until this consent has actually been given. This money will be secured some time in January, but, according to the commissioners, it will only be about half enough.

Now what the commissioners desire is that the town appropriate a like amount, or as much as possible, for this purpose. The representative of the commissioners appointed by them to work up the exhibit, and take charge of it, has seen most of the principal business men of the city, and says they are unreservedly in favor of this appropriation being made by the town.

The responsibility for the success of our exhibit at the Charleston Exposition now rest with the town council and we await with interest their action. Much depends upon the exhibit, and the exhibit depends upon the council. It is now up to the town.

Since writing the above we have learned that the county commissioners have decided to give the ladies half of this appropriation, and that Mr. Higgins, the gentleman appointed by the commissioners to take charge of the exhibit, thinking that the county can not get together its exhibit without all this amount and more besides, has resigned.

We hope the matter will soon be settled in some way, for after all the efforts that have been made, the county should not be allowed to be without an exhibit at the Exposition. If the ladies can see their way clear to get along without this money, we hope they will consider the advisability of letting it go to help the county exhibit, for this is of the greatest importance, and in an exhibit of the resources and industries of the county the ladies will be well represented. However, Newberry county must have the exhibit, and we believe if the money can be secured in no other way the business men of the town will contribute it if the matter is put before them in the proper light.

Tillman and McLaurin are now fighting over the question as to which one deserves the glory of securing the government exhibit for Charleston, and getting through Congress the resolution providing that all foreign imports in the shape of exhibits, etc., to Charleston during the progress of the Exposition, shall be admitted to this country free of charge. McLaurin claims that he was to introduce the resolution, had it prepared, and was going to introduce it but that Tillman secured the floor for the introduction of bills, and would not concede the floor to McLaurin and when he had finished with his bills, ticked on to them the Exposition resolution thus stealing from McLaurin the credit for it. The controversy has been very warm, but we hope the Senators will soon stop talking and get down to hard work and see which can get ahead of the other in getting through Congress the next resolution which will be of real benefit to the State.

Queen Wilhelmina seems to be having a good deal of trouble with her husbands, and from what we can gather from the newspaper reports the couple are not enjoying that bliss which the novels say people who marry because they love each other always enjoy. The indications are that the meeting will be largely attended and the people of the State will soon read what kind of a thing the Charleston Exposition really is.

If they have no other business to attend to they should at least hold a meeting and appoint a committee to pass upon bills which they owe.

NEWBERRY POSTMASTER-SHIP.

A Hitch in the Programme and the Merit of the Candidates for the Office of Postmaster at Newberry, S. C.

Washington, December 10.—Aspirants for the Newberry post-office are counting noses at the delay of the President in making an appointment, and the friends of the various candidates are hotly agitating the subject at the White House and the post-office department.

At the present writing it seems that Mr. Purcell, who has the endorsement of Senator McLaurin and also the kindly disposition of District Attorney Cappers, appears to be first choice. It is understood his appointment was cordially agreed upon some time ago, and it was to have been announced last week.

There is, however, a hitch in the programme at the post-office department, and it is said that an appointment may not be made before the Christmas holidays.

Mr. Scott, who claims to be the only republican in the race, has been here for several days looking after his interests, but he went home to-night, hopeful, but uncertain, as to when a decision will be reached. In the meantime the other candidates, Mr. Byrum, acting Postmaster W. D. Henson, H. D. Parr, Dr. Lake, Messrs. Davidson and Stewart, all received appointments, are being urged by their respective sponsors with all the pressure of their command. Special to News and Courier.
