GOLDVILLE MILLS IN TROUBLE.

A Corporation in Laurens County Put in the Hands of a Receiver.

Laurens, December 6.—The Goldville Manufacturing Company, of this county, situated fourteen miles from this city, at a station on the Columbia, Newberry and Laurens Railroad, consisting of lands, cotton mill and oil mill, is in trouble. At the suit of the Columbia, Newberry and Laurens Railroad, plaintiffs, Robertson & Lyles, attorneys, the corporation is alleged to be insolvent and has been put in the hands of a receiver. Mr. C. C. Featherstone, of this city, has been appointed receiver and has filed his bond. The large creditors belong to Charleston and Columbia, and the debts probably reach a hundred thousand. The corporation was chartered a little over a year ago and has been operated during the present year. L. W. C. Black is the manager of the corporation. —Special to N and Courier.

Auditor's Notice. OFFICE OF COUNTY AUDITOR, NEWBERRY, S. C., DECEMBER 10, 1901. OR AN AUTHORIZED AGENT I will be at the following places named below, for the purpose of taking returns of Real and Personal property for the year 1902:

At Newberry January 1st to 16th. At Chappell's, Jan. 17th. At Longshores, Jan. 18th. At Whitmires, Jan. 20th. At Maybinton, Jan. 21st. At Walton, Jan. 22nd. At Pomaria, Jan. 23rd. At Jolly Street, Jan. 24th. At Slight's, Jan. 26th. At O'Neal's, Jan. 27th. At St. Luke's, Jan. 28th. At Prosperity, Jan. 29th and 30th. And at Newberry until February 20th, after which time the law requires a penalty of 50 per cent. to be added.

All notes, mortgages, and moneys are taxable and male persons between the ages of 21 and 60 years are liable to poll tax, unless exempt by law. The law provides also for an income tax on gross incomes of \$2,500 and upwards.

Don't ask that your return be taken the same as last year, or say that there is no change. All returns must be made on proper blanks and sworn to by parties making the same.

In making returns of Real Estate be sure and state whether you have bought or sold since last return, also give the names of adjoining land owners.

All personal property owned controlled by the taxpayer on the 1st of January must be listed as his or her property.

Land is assessed as the property of the person having the legal title at the time of assessment.
