Applying Cotton Seed to Corn.

We publish below a second communication
on this subject, and hope to have
many more, as it is a matter of consider-
able importance. We observe that the
views of "Subscribers," and those of cor-
respondent last week, differ in several
respects; but this is the way to get at the
truth! Farmers, write for the Agricul-
tural Department of the Times. Your

COMMUNICATED.

Mr. Editor:—In your issue of the
15th, "Corn Planter" wants to hear from
some of your readers the best method of
applying cotton seed to corn. I will give
you my plan, hoping to hear from some
one else. I run off my rows, six feet one
way by three the other, with a large plow,
as deep as I will can; and put the seed
on either side of the grain of corn, the
same way. Cover all with a hoe. I think
25 bushels to the acre pays me the best.
Of course, the better the land the better
the seed will pay. I would rather have the
seed green I think they last longer. As soon
as I get a stand, I run round the wide way
with a small sweep, and in a few days I
plow it up the narrow way with a
sweep also, like cotton. The next two
plowings the wide way, and my corn is
made. Now, I would like to hear from
some of your readers the best method, or
way, of planting Irish potatoes, the best
manure to use, and the manner of culti-
vating them.

THE PROPER DEPTH FOR DEPOSITING
COMMERCIAL FERTILIZERS.

The depth for depositing, depends first
on depth of soil. With a soil broken five
inches deep, the furrow in which the
fertilizer is deposited, should be three
inches deep, made with a shovel. With
a soil ten inches deep, have the furrow
eight inches deep; with a soil two inches
deep, the furrow should be one inch deep.
In every case the fertilizer should be de-
posited with the hand, so as to have the
manure distributed from the top to the
bottom of the furrow, thus enabling the
cotton plant to reach it at once, as soon
as it is up. The amount of fertilizers
which may be advantageously applied
per acre, depends also on the depth of
broken soil. With two inches soil, 100
lbs per acre is all that should be used.
With four inches soil, 200 lbs.; with
eight inches soil, 500 lbs. With a broken
soil of four inches depth, should the
manure be deposited eight inches deep
with a Dow Law or Tin horn as is usu-
ally done, you will in the first place have
your fertilizer four inches below your
broken land; in the second place you
will have it embedded in the clay, which
will soon lock it up from both air and
rootlets.

Soon after Mr. Dickson gave his for-
mula for depositing mixtures for cotton,
(in a double furrow eight inches deep)
thousands of dollars were lost in Middle
Geo. in this way—your correspond-
ent being one of those who suffered. The
principal good secured in running twice

in furrowing off for cotton, is the deep
breaking, and not the deep depositing of
the fertilizers.

The depth of deposit in the second
place, depends on the fertilizer used.
Stable Manure, Dissolved Bones and Pe-
ruvian Guano, "Merrymans' Ammonia-
ted Bones" dissolved with Sulphuric
Acid and all others highly ammoniated,
must be deposited at that depth, which
will prevent the cotton from firing and
throwing off squares, in case of drought.
This trouble however is much easier
counteracted by deep ploughing than
otherwise. My rule is to break deep—
run my furrows with a shovel about four
inches deep, deposit 200 lbs. Merrymans'
Ammoniated Dissolved Bones with the
hand, bed up and harrow off the beds
just before planting. My manure falling
on both sides of the furrow, the majority
of course at the bottom, my cotton be-
gins to appropriate it at once, and under
this arrangement, I have no cause to roll
my seed, in Guano. By the use of the
Cotton Harrow before and after planting,
on the top of the bed, the hoes have no
occasion to do more than simply chop
through the cotton, not disturbing the
surface more than half inch deep. With
the old plan of sowing with two furrows
and allowing the cotton to become grassy,
it makes but little difference as to depth
of depositing fertilizers, (or, indeed
whether you deposit any at all), you will
be compelled to hoe it all up to get the
grass out. In this case I would recommend
that the fertilizers be deposited with the
Manufacturers.—L. F. Livingston, in South-
era Cultivator.

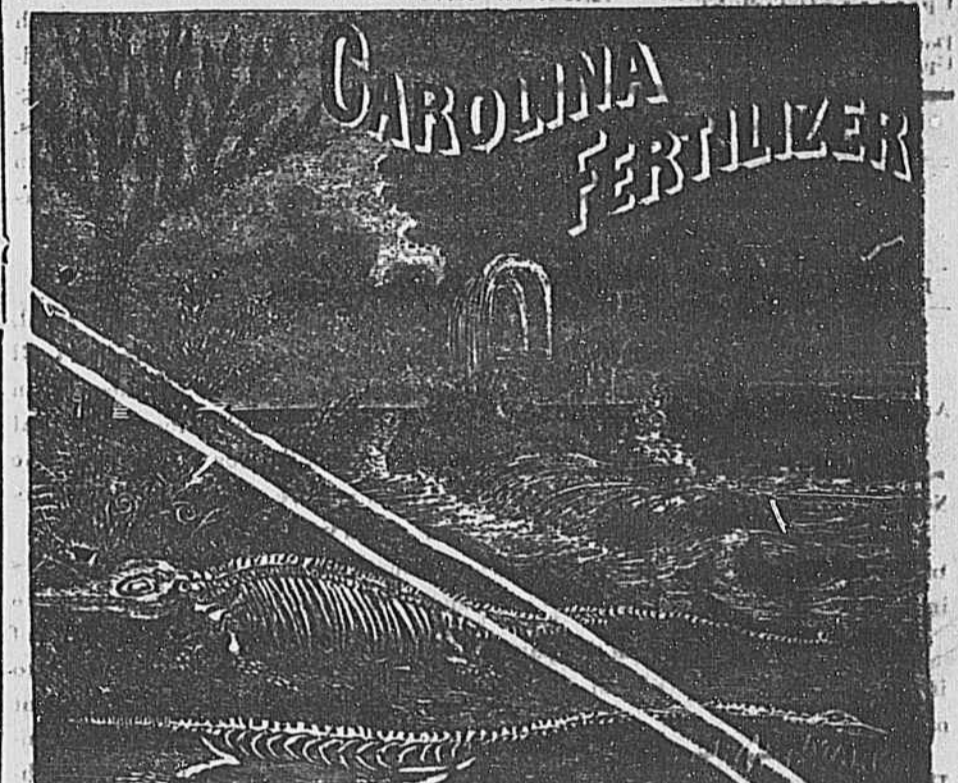
