IMPORTANT ALTERATIONS IN THE HOMESTEAD ACT

At the recent session of the General Assembly, the above act was amended in some very essential particulars, some of which look towards the protection of the interest of creditor, as well as debtor.

Sec. 1. provides: "That the homestead shall consist of the dwelling house, out-buildings and lands appurtenant, not to exceed the value of \$1000, and the yearly product thereof, thereby restricting and limiting the right of homestead to definite objects.

Sec. 3. provides: "That whenever the appraisers shall find that the premises, above mentioned, exceed the value of \$1000, the person so claiming shall pay to the Sheriff the surplus of the appraised value over and above \$1000, within sixty days, and in default thereof the sheriff is required to sell said premises and out of proceeds of sale to pay into the office of the Clerk of the Court \$1000, which shall be applied in the purchase of a homestead of that value.
