DEPARTMENTS.

These are represented by letters, from B. to N. inclusive—Department A. being devoted to field crops, many of which are not yet gathered.

DEPT. B.

under superintendance of Morgan Keller Esq., embraces samples of field crops, including bales of cotton, hay, pea-vines, pinder vines and millet. The show of these is very fine, as also specimens of cotton stalks, sheaves of oats, wheat and rice. Mammoth pumpkins, potatoes, turnips &c., are here in great abundance.

DEPT. C.

Supt. W. W. Culler, Esq., is composed of specimens of garden and orchard products, including the flower-garden. It is situated on the right as one goes up, and its tables and stands are well-filled.

DEPT. D.

presided over by Jas. Stokes, Esq., is devoted to the good things of the "Household," and it makes ones mouth water to see the rolls of fresh butter, with breads of all kinds to match, and cakes of every description to wind up on. But "hands off" is staring you wherever you go, and these can be tasted only in imagination.

DEPT. E.

embraces the "sweetmeats," of which Capt. Jas. F. Izlar is the happy guardian. The eye wears in looking at the endless number of jars filled with delicacies, and the tongue and lips long for employment, but the "Times" has, unfortunately, not been placed in the "tasting committee. A table containing wines, &c. adjoins this department.

DEPT. F.

Supt. Dr. J. H. O'Casey, contains specimens of "Plain Needle work," and if this includes the "quilts," his department nearly embraces the whole upper room. But we must not enlarge on the quilt question, as the ladies have not entirely forgiven the "Times" for calling particular attention to the fine display of them at the last Fair. Adjoining this department is that of

under charge of Capt. E. J. Felder, and is known as the "Fancy needle work" Dept. It is situated in West end of building, and to the ladies forms the chief attraction of the Fair. Our reporter, (whose knowledge of these matters is limited, and only professes to know the difference between a baby dress and a specimen of needle work) was confused by the display, and being unable to express an opinion, asked two lady friends, well qualified to judge of these matters, how the present turn out compared with the former years; they replied that it was "much superior" to any previous exhibition, and we think they will be sustained by all lady visitors to the fair.

DEPT. N.

under Capt. T. A. Jeffords, comprises miscellaneous articles, including Fine Arts. We think the display better than ever before in this Dept., and regret we cannot enumerate the many deserving specimens exhibited.

DEPT. H.

is upon lower floor, presided over by H.

Riggs, Esq., and comprises all "Machinery," including gins, corn-mills &c., which are fairly tested by the committee.

DEPT. J.

Supt. Jno. S. Bowman, seems to be divided between the lower and upper floors, and is devoted to "Manufactures."—There is an endless variety in this Department, which is one of the most creditable in the exhibition.

DEPT'S K., L. AND M.

are outside of the Fair Building, and compose the stock of horses, mules &c., cattle, sheep and hogs, and poultry.—These are presided over respectively by Mr. W. T. Muller, Mr. R. H. Riley, and John C. Holman. Our space and time will only allow us to say that each of these Departments are fuller and better than at any previous exhibition. This can be truthfully said of the entire Fair of 1873: that it is a monument to the enterprise of our farming community, to which any county might point with pride.
