The Georgetown member (Brawley) was on the QUI VIVE to have current expenses provided for, and offered a bill to authorize the Treasurer to issue \$200,000 of the Tremaining \$500,000 of the act of Dec '65 for the purpose aforesaid. Tim Hurley, Joe Crews, and Boston opposed the bill and it was defeated by a large vote. A violation of this amendment of Ordinance regulating the sale of horses and mules, shall subject the offender to a fine of fiae dollars, (\$5.00) for each and every offence, or not less than 5 days imprisonment, nor more than ten days.


