**A Life for Fifty Cents.**  
**A TERRIBLE TRAGEDY IN NEW YORK CITY.**  
On Monday at 1 30 P. M., in an alley at 129 West Twenty-seventh street, William Scanlon, aged 19, of 380 East Twentieth street, was fatally stabbed by James McMahon, aged 16. Scanlon was employed as driver by Crotty & Madden soda water manufacturers in the basement in which the boys fought. He had worked for them nearly eighteen months, and bore an excellent reputation for industry and honesty. McMahon also worked occasionally for the same firm, but was discharged a few weeks ago. He slept in a stable on the premises, and for a week or two past has subsisted upon odd quarters given him, work around the stable, and upon what he could steal. Scanlon owed him a dollar and a half for washing his wagon. On Saturday night he demanded his money, but Scanlon said he was short and paid him only one dollar. McMahon grew very angry and swore that "he would get even with him; that he knew half a dozen boys that could lick him." Scanlon promised to pay him as soon as he could, and the dispute ended there.  
Yesterday when Scanlon returned from his delivery trip, McMahon again demanded his money, and used very abusive language. Scanlon reminded him that Crotty & Madden had ordered him to stay away from the premises, and told him he would put him out if he did not go. McMahon grew more abusive, whereupon Scanlon seized him and they had a scuffle of a minute's duration, which ended in McMahon's being put out, with his face considerably bruised. As he went out he turned and swore that he would have his revenge. Several other employees who saw the scuffle and did not interfere also heard the threat, but thought he merely designed to collect a mob of the young thieves of the neighborhood, with whom he had been consorting, and way-lay Scanlon. He was absent hardly a minute. Emile Bourlier, the bookkeeper, saw him when he returned, and suspected that he intended to renew the fight, but seeing no weapon, thought he would let them fight it out. As the boy passed James Slattery, also an employee, the latter saw a knife in his hand, and grappled with him to take it away. "Let go of me, Jim Slattery," said the boy. "Let go of me or I'll stick you, too."  
Slattery says that he thought of his wife and children, and deemed it best to let him go. The boy sprang toward Scanlon, brandishing a knife, exclaiming, "Now I'll be even with you." Scanlon closed with him and a brief struggle ensued for the knife. McMahon lunged, and Scanlon, drawing back, raised his hand to his heart, exclaimed, "Oh, God; I am stabbed to death." He reeled, but before he fell his clothes were dyed with blood. Slattery and Bourlier ran to him, and McMahon started for the door. As he went out he picked up a soda bottle and threw it at the group, it missed them. He then threw the knife, which fell at Bourlier's feet. Scanlon died in five minutes. The knife entered just above the collar bone on the left side, and penetrated about four inches, cutting an artery and probably reaching the lungs.  
After Scanlon's death Bourlier be-thought him of arresting the murderer. He had merely run across the street and seemed stupefied by his crime. The street was lined with persons who had heard of the murder, but none attempted to apprehend the boy. Officer Kelly of the Thirtieth street police arrived and took hold of him. He then made a desperate but unsuccessful effort to break away. He was taken to the station and then to the Tombs. He stole the knife from a grocery store adjoining in his absence after the first scuffle. It is a butcher knife with a five-inch blade, and was used in the grocery to cut dried meats. An order was obtained from the Coroner to take Scanlon's body to his residence at once. He was the chief support of his aged parents.  
McMahon's mother called at the station last evening, hoping to see her boy. She admits that he has been very bad. Once at least he was arrested for stealing, and was well known to the police as one of a gang of young desperadoes that infest the ward.—Sun.
