**THE LEGISLATURE**  
 Has at last adjourned, and all honest men are glad. We had thought that, as this was the age of improvement, this Legislature with its high sounding promises, which were made in the last campaign; would at least be a little better than its predecessors; but we find that their promises, made during a close campaign, are like the following:  
 "The Devil sick, the devil a saint would be  
 The Devil well, a devil of a saint is he."  
 In vain have the people looked for some good law. In vain has the conservative party cried out against corrupt rings, but with no seeming effect. In the mean time the rings get enriched and our property almost confiscated. Poor men, who had been living from hand to mouth, after two sessions, of six hundred dollars a year, come away driving fast horses, and clothed in purple and fine linen. "Can this be, we are ruined by cheap legislation." It has been said that, a land without law is land without liberty, but we can say that a land with a Legislature like ours, is (after the Legislature adjourns) a land without money; for what the Legislators fail to put in their pockets is consumed by taxes for Charitable Institutions, as the Penitentiary. The people of the State have a bright future before them, for soon there will be nothing left to take, and then we will at last be FREE.

**A NEW IDEA.**  
**SYE SINGLETON.**—This old public nuisance, the dread of merchants, was flung yesterday by Captain Jackson, who took him to the South Carolina train and turned him over to a person going to Charleston, with instructions to drop him on the road somewhere near Orangeburg. With Pinckney, the chicken thief, in jail and Old Sye, the chronic kleptomaniac in the country, the people herabouts can keep their doors open for a spell.  
 We clip the above from the Columbia Union Herald. We understand that the party referred to arrived here safe yesterday. This is the first time that we have heard of Orangeburg being a penal colony. If the Town Council of Columbia can't take care of their own thieves and robbers, the people of Columbia had better put some one in there who can. It may be true that some disreputable persons go from each county to Columbia, but is that any reason for the town council of Columbia to send a notorious character down here; giving him a free pass; and we suppose lunch? Perhaps, since the Legislature has adjourned, Columbia wants to get rid of her vagrants; but why to Orangeburg? why not choose Charleston or some other place? As Columbia sends vagrants here, we can retaliate. So Look out Columbia.

The Legislature at its late session passed a joint resolution requiring Mr. Cain, the Sheriff of Orangeburg, to give a new official bond within ten days after its passage, and in failing to do so, declared the office vacant, and authorized the Governor to order an election to fill the vacancy. This joint resolution was approved on the 20th of December last, and official information was received at the Executive office yesterday from the chairman of the Board of County Commissioners that Mr. Cain had not filed a new bond as required. This will necessitate a new election, and the usual proclamation ordering the same will be issued shortly.

## OUR CHARLESTON LETTER.

CHARLESTON, S. C. March 25, 1874.  
 St Patrick's day was celebrated in a quiet but thorough manner last week—the Saint has always been an especial favorite with our Irish citizens here and the day was in former years sacredly kept. Disposition was shown by the present generation to follow in the foot-steps of their forefathers and there was consequently a strong military turn out with much music and many green banners four or five showy clubs of Riflemen composed the procession—the day was beautiful and the men in their neat and showy uniforms made an imposing and martial show in front rode the marshals of the parade very gorgeously attired in green sashes feathers &c., in the rear marched that time honored association "St. Patrick's Benevolent Society," each member wearing a green rosette, in the evening something "hot" refreshed the soldiers after the fatigues of the day. It is rumored that the approaching German Schutzenfest is to be the largest and most pretentious our city has yet beheld—the annual celebration of this festival has been since the war growing more and more popular with all classes. Occurring at a time of the year when nature after her long sleep is awaking to renewed strength and beauty and puts on her most magnificent apparel. It affords a pleasant and agreeable recreation to the many and hard worked citizens who with his family is delighted to have the chance of a season of holiday and to spend a day among the green trees and flowers. Well aware of the interest your country people feel in the amusements and pastime of our "city by the sea" your Correspondent called on Capt. C. G. Ducku the polite and efficient Commander of the German Rifle club who cheerfully communicated all information with regard to what arrangement had been so far entered into for the festival. Every exertion has been used to render the access of strangers easy and cheap. The different railroads and many of the steamship lines have consented to carry passengers to and from the fete at reduced rates. The grounds or "platz" of the club which have already been one of the most attractive spots around Charleston are now so renovated and beautified that they are indeed worthy of a visit at any time. In the place of the old hall formerly standing in the middle of the yard a spacious structure standing at one end of the platz confronts the visitor as he enters so arranged however as to give a clear and unobstructed view of the broad and restless Ashley in the distance—a park has also been laid out. In short the improvements are many and much to be praised.  
 On the 6th of April next the new hall is to be dedicated, and on the 20th the Schutzenfest commences to continue as usual for three days. Numerous novel amusements, it is reported will be introduced. Among others a very popular contrivance much used in Germany and on the Continent generally—Consisting of an inclined plane on which is laid a railroad on reaching the top usually by a flight of steps one finds a little car just large enough for two. One or we will say two jumps in, the carman gives a shove and down the plane rolls the car with a speed that almost takes the breath away. It is of these affairs that "Moore" in the "Fudge family papers" speaks. There are cars that set out (he says)  
 "From a lighted pavilion, high up in the air,  
 And rattle you down Doll you hardly know where—  
 These vehicles, mind me, in which you go through,  
 This delightfully dangerous journey holds two."  
 And with regard to the transit  
 Some gentlemen asks you—you smile, it's a Match—  
 In an instant you're seated, and down both together,  
 Go thundering, as if you went post to old scratch

**Our Distinguished Statesmen**  
 On Friday night last another exhibition was given by those who go through the forms of legislation in Columbia. The speaker had called J. D. Boston, colored of Newberry to the chair, while he went to the senate to assist in the ratification of acts. It was however impossible to do any further business. Some of the members were evidently under the influence of liquor, and in proportion to the quantity of bad whiskey consumed their belligerent propensities increased. Hastings Gantt, of Beaufort, a negro of about a shade darker than Boston, who was filling the chair made some point of order which the speaker overruled. Whereupon Gantt arose to another point of order, the gist of which was that "the mahogany colored nigger that was in the chair was not fit to be there." Hamilton, of Beaufort, intimated that it was the business of the chair to make his colleague apologize. To which the chair replied that the remark was too contemptible to merit his notice. Wil-

son a certificate grabber from Sumter, in language more pointed than refined, intimated that the speaker was a fool and got his rulings out of an almanac. It began to be apparent now that there would be a general row, and it was deemed expedient to adjourn.

## AN ORDINANCE.

To RAISE SUPPLIES FOR THE TOWN OF ORANGEBURG, S. C., FOR THE FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING APRIL 1, 1874, AND A BILL TO REGULATE LICENCES.

SECTION 1. Be it ordained by the Town Council of Orangeburg and it is hereby ordained by the authority of the same, that the following taxes be and are hereby assessed and levied for the fiscal year beginning April 1st A. D. 1874 and after the following rates, that is to say, at the rate of one tenth per centum on the assessed value of all real estate, lying and being within the corporate limits of Orangeburg S. C. including every building or other improvements on land under lease from bodies corporate or individuals, for any term of years.  
 Sec. 2. Be it further ordained that every person firm, company, or corporation, engaged in any trade, business or profession hereinafter mentioned shall obtain, on or before the 1st day of April A. D. 1874, a licence therefor in a manner provided:  
 First: those commencing business after the 1st of April A. D. 1874, shall obtain a licence before entering upon that business.  
 Second: every person, firm, company or corporation, engaged in trade business or profession to obtain a licence to engage in trade business or profession for which a licence is required shall register with the Town Clerk or his assistant his or her name or style, and in case of a firm or company their names or styles of such firms or companies and their place of business.  
 Third: their trade business or profession for which a licence is required.  
 Fourth: the place where such trade business or profession is to be carried on: all of which, and answers to questions relative to which shall be given under oath.  
 Sec. 3. If any person or persons shall exercise or carry on any trade business or profession for which a licence is required by this ordinance, without taking out such licence by this ordinance, without as in that behalf required, they, she, or they shall, besides being liable for the payment of the licence be subject to a penalty not exceeding twenty dollars to be sued for and collected in any court of competent jurisdiction; one fourth of the penalty, after deducting expenses of prosecution, to be paid to the person who first informs of the matter and things whereby the penalty is recovered; the other three fourths to the benefits and uses of the town.  
 Sec. 4. In every licence to be taken out under or by authority of this ordinance shall be continued and set forth the purposes trade business or profession for which such licence is granted and the name and place of business of the person or persons taking out the same.  
 Sec. 5. The Town Clerk and assessor shall prepare a proper licence to be issued in each case which licence shall be kept by the person receiving the same in a conspicuous place as the Town Clerk may direct.  
 Sec. 6. A licence granted on and after the 1st day of April A. D. 1874 shall continue in force until the 1st day of April A. D. 1875 and all licences granted after the 1st day of April A. D. 1874 shall be issued upon the payment of a rateable proportion of the whole amount of money imposed for such licence provided, however, that no licence be granted for less than three months, though the time to the end of the year be less than that.  
 Sec. 7. Each licence granted shall be dated on the first day of the month in which the liability therefor accrues, and the amount to be paid therefor shall be computed therefrom, until the end of the year. And every person exercising or carrying on any trade business or profession shall keep said licence in their possession and unless they shall do so, shall be deemed and taken to have no licence, and it shall be the duty of the Town Marshal and detective force to report any violation thereof.  
 Sec. 8. Upon the removal of any person or persons from the house or premises at which the trade business or profession mentioned in such as was authorized, it may and shall be lawful for the Town Clerk to authorize by endorsement of such licence the person removing as aforesaid in any other place in the corporation, to carry on the trade business or profession specified in such licence at the place to which such person may have removed.  
 Sec. 9. For a licence to carry on any trade business or profession herein after mentioned shall be paid to the Town Clerk or Treasurer viz: retail Apothecaries \$10.00 Ambrosyphs \$3.00 Architects \$3.00 Auctioneers \$5.00 De-guerian Artists \$3.00 Agencies for Fire and Life Insurance Companies each \$10.00 and for all other agencies by other than regular licensed merchants for each member carrying on the agency \$5.00 Banks or their branches \$5.00 Retail dealer in goods wares and merchandise (excluding distilled spirits) whose Annual sales are not over \$10,000 and under \$5,000, Those whose Annual sales are over \$10,000 and under \$30,000, \$10.00, those over \$30,000, \$15.00, Dentists each \$5.00, Printing offices \$5.00 Lawyers each \$5.00, Barbers each \$2.00, Tailors \$2.00 Drays Wagons Omnibusses and Carriages who haul for hire each \$3.00 Circuses each per day to be paid before exhibition \$25.00 Menageries each per day \$10.00 Practising Physicians each \$5.00, Peddlers per month \$10.00 Huck-sters \$3.00, per year, Cabinet makers \$2.00, wholesale Liquor Dealer \$50.00. (Every person firm or corporation whose business it is to sell distilled spirits fermented liquors or wines of any kind in quantities of one quart and over shall be regarded as wholesale liquor dealer) retail liquor dealers or Bar Rooms \$75.00 (whose business it is to sell distilled spirits fermented liquors or wines of and kind by the glass or otherwise shall be termed retail liquor dealers) Hotels \$5.00, Boarding Houses private \$3.00, Bakeries \$3.00, Millinery \$3.00, Saddle and Harness makers and repairers of same \$2.00 Boot and Shoe makers \$2.00, Carriage and Wheelwright shops \$5.00 Turners \$3.00 Jewellers and Watch and Clock repairers \$3.00, Master Mechanics \$2.00, Tinners \$3.00 Billiard Tables \$10.00, each. Gun Smiths, \$2.00, Steam Grind Mills that grind for toll \$5.00 Black Smiths \$2.00.

Sec. 10. Be it further ordained that all male inhabitants of the Town of Orangeburg between the ages of 18 and 55 years liable to Road duty, shall be subject to a compound Tax of 1.00 each which said Tax shall be appropriated to the uses and improvements of the corporation.  
 Sec. 11. Be it further ordained that Hucksters licences shall not be liable to any deduction on account of the time in which such licence shall be issued.  
 Sec. 12. Be it further ordained that any person failing to make a correct return of Real Estate in compliance with Tax notice published then the Town Clerk shall be empowered to assess the same.  
 Sec. 13. Be it further ordained that all ordinances or part of ordinances levying a Tax or prescribing the mode or time of returning or paying the same or any other regulation in relation thereto are thereby continued, in full force and effect so far as the same are not in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance.  
 Sec. 14. Be it further ordained that all Town taxes on Real Estate and licences required under this ordinance shall be payable within forty days from the 1st day of April A. D. 1874. All Taxes unpaid after the expiration of that time shall be subject to an additional Tax of Twenty per centum on licences and Ten per centum on Real Estate.  
 Sec. 15. Be it further ordained that the fiscal year shall begin on the 1st day of April A. D. 1874.  
 Sec. 16. Be it further ordained that this ordinance shall remain in force until amended or repealed.  
 Sec. 17. Be it further ordained that all ordinances or part of ordinances militating against this ordinance be and the same are hereby repealed.


