For a day or two before his arrest, rumers were current about the streets, that he had defaulted to a large amount; some had it thirty-three, some thirty, and some twenty thousand dollars. He was arrested on Thursday morning, and in the evening was taken before two trial justices and bailed out until the May term of the Court. The amount of his bail was \$10,000.

That the Chief of the Fire Department and he 2nd Assistant Chief, shall be elected by the members of the Town Council, and the two highest officers of each of the chartered Companies of the Fire Department, on joint ballot. That the 1st. Assistant Chief shall be elected ov the Town Council.

That the Mayor of the Town shall be Ex Officio a member of the Board of Fire Masters. All parts of ordinances or regulations in conflict with this ordinance, so far as they are nconsistent herewith, are repealed.
