The next important State election occurs in North Carolina on the 6th of August.

The June term of court cost Beaufort county nearly thirty-five hundred dollars.

A colored Masonic Lodge has been recently organized in Newberry, and to be called the Meridian Lodge of the A. Y. M.

The Augusta Chronicle & Sentinel thinks that the Republican party will make the hardest fight this campaign, that they have made since 1868.

A new bug has appeared in the West which is said to be an enemy to the grasshopper. It eats up all of the corn before the grasshopper can get at it.

Twenty of the thirty-two county treasurers in the State have settled their accounts with the Comptroller General, and have gone on their way rejoicing.

The president has signed the currency bill which takes away thirty millions of national bank currency from the east and distributes it to the south and west.
