Whatever views may be held, in this day of political agitation, as to the merits of the "Lost Cause," no one would take away from our gallant dead their grand epitaph, "They died for their principles."

It is a subject which demands our most earnest attention for it is always the duty of the living to show respect to the dead, but especially so, when the cause which brought them to the grave was ours as well as theirs.

The cost of the monument which is under the superintendence of the distinguished architects, Muldoon & Co., of Kentucky, will be \$10,000, half of which is already paid, and the balance will only require the small sum of \$200 from each county.
