The severe storm on Monday caused a wash on the track of the South Carolina Railroad below Branchville, which interrupted the passage of the trains on Tuesday.

If the Republicans don't intend to cheat in the coming election, they will cause one good Conservative to be appointed in each county on the Board of Commissioners of Election.

Considerable damage was done by the gale on Monday in Charleston, and its vicinity. The old bathing house is gone, and the sea wall on East Battery is a mass of crumbling ruins.

We regret to learn of the death of Mr. Joseph Inabnet for many years an efficient employee of the South Carolina Railroad, residing at this place. Our sympathies are with his afflicted family.

We understand that a change has been made in the Commissioners of Election; J. P. Mays and Fordham being substituted for A. B. Knowlton and F. R. McKinlay.
