The Orangeburg Fair.

Opened on Tuesday with flattering prospects of success. The first day being election day, the crowd of visitors was not as great as it may otherwise have been, but from all the indications Wednesday and Thursday will be the attractive days.

We had no time in our cursory view on Tuesday to give a full description of all we saw. In fact the great variety of the FAIR specimens of every kind, so bewildered us, that we could not concentrate our thoughts on any one particular object. Some of the departments we noticed were fuller than usual, while a few seemed to fall a little behind.

We were particularly struck with the "Sweet Meat Department." We don't think the specimens of pickles, preserves &c., could be excelled. We noticed also some of the finest and most tempting cakes on exhibition.

The "Fine Art Department" is also in our opinion far ahead of previous years. We were highly pleased with the fine crayons and water color drawings. The view of Mackays point was familiar.

The painting on two buggies done by Mr. James A. Williams of our town was exquisite, and speaks well for Mr. Williams as a fancy painter.

The "Poultry Department" is doubtless one of the most attractive in the Fair. We saw one coop of "Buff Bramas" and one coop of 'Light Bramas' exhibited by Mr. T. W. Muller, which kept us spell bound for several minutes in consequence of their unusual size and beauty. In the pigeon line a pair of "White Ruffs," and a pair of 'Carriers' were exquisitely beautiful.

Our attention was called to a specimen of Orangeburg Phosphate from phosphate rock in the upper part of Orangeburg County. If this leads to the development of mines of this treasure, our old county will make new strides in the progress of wealth.

We were also attracted by the stuffed head and tail of a fox caught recently in England by a hunting party, and brought to the Orangeburg Fair by one of the party, who is a well known and highly esteemed citizen of our county, ever having the interest of our people nearest to his heart.

The Fair on Wednesday was well attended, the Tournament being the attraction of the day. The procession was composed of seventeen Knights presenting an unusually fine appearance. The Judges were Capt. T. A. Jeffords, Cephas McMichael Esq. and Dr. Smoke.

The 1st., Prize was gained by the "Knight of Glencoe" E. L. Salley. 2d Prize by the 'Knight of Bamberg' W. J. Jones. 3rd by the "Knight of Santee" G. A. Fairy.

Miss Mincie Hartzog of Bamberg was crowned Queen, and wore her honors with grace and dignity.

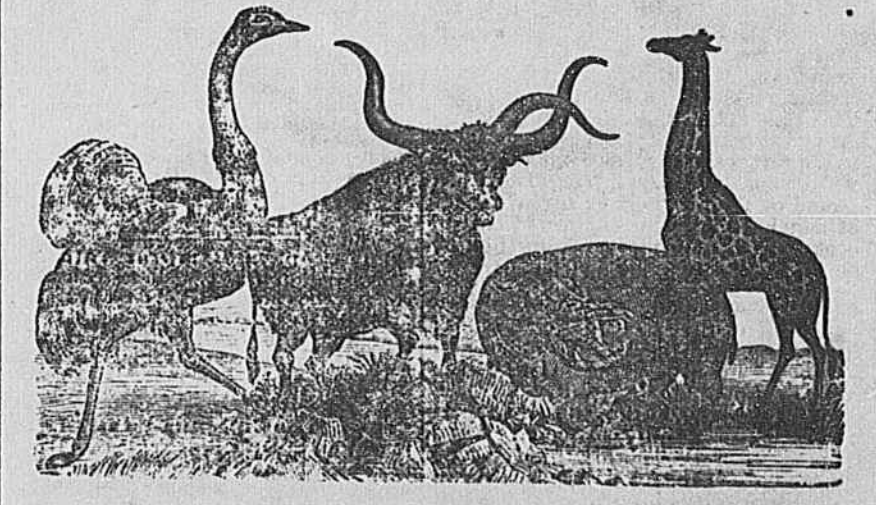
