THE SOUTH'S COTTON OROP. Shepperson Belleves the Present Aereas Exagerated and the Crop Limited.

and intelligent statement of the cotton situation at the present time, the News and Courier applied to Mr. Alfred B. Shepperson, of New York, the well-known cotton statistician and has received the following very lucid and satisfactory reply: "Cotton declined again yesterday, chiefly,

"Cottoy reply: "Cotto declined again yesterday, chiefty, I understand, upon a crop estimate just issued by Mr. Nelli, of New Orleans, that the crop will be over ten millions of bales. The crop is un-doubtedly a large one, but I confess that I am unable to see any basis of such a large esti-mate. The largest crop ever grown in this country was that which was grown in fise. The yield of that crop was probably nine mil-lion, twe hundred thousand bales. The con-mercial crop of that season was \$.676,000 bales and the difference between this and the gua-tity which I have given as the probable yield was marketed in the fellowing season. There is no evidence whatever to prove that the acreage of the crop now being marketed was any larger than that of the orep of 1800-91, nor is there any evidence, to my mind at least, thas the weather conditions have been more favorable this year than in 1890. I am at a loss, therefore, to understand to what cause or causes can be reasonably stiributed a yield so much in excess of the monater crop of 1890.

"There can be no question that unless the price advances very greatly by the time for planting the next crop that the acronge devoted to cotton will be reduced to an extent that it never has been curtailed before, from ene year to another. So great a reduction in acreage would cause beyond doubt an advance as great and as rapid as the decline has been."

DALLAS, Tex., November 13. - The otton crop is ended. The thermometer was at 32 degrees at daylight yes terday morning. Your correspondent rode twenty miles through the fields yesterday. They are black, the stalks are dead, hulls, blooms, squares and all. Not one pound more can be made this year. Half the patches have been picked clean, the other half will the stay-at-homes and the dese yield a little more possibly. An eighth of the amount already picked is ginned and either marketed or lying at the gin-and all of its rivals lost votes to the houses. As no rain of any consequence has fallen in three months, the plan-ters are well up with picking. There is no reason to prevent their marketing every bale within the next six weeks. cept low prices and the hope that later the season they may get an advance. They are manimous upon one point, not to plant more than half the present area next year. Hundreds have de-termined to plant none at all for the good and sufficient reason that it don't pay. 


