To Knights young and old alike was he companion, and to many of us was he a tutor in much pertaining to our knighthood. Ever ready to give counsel and advice to the young and rising Knight, and prepared always to share the responsibilities and undertakings of the older ones, he was a man whose opinions we respected, and who in emergencies could be relied upon.

To those who knew him best he was of that order of men who belong to the highest type. Positive in his opinions, and true to his convictions, he was ever ready to take his place and stand his ground final and forever for what he deemed right, it mattered not if it placed him in the ranks of a hopeless minority. 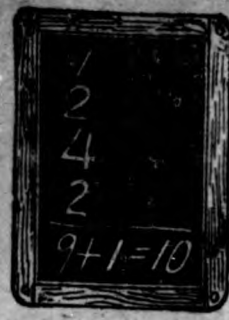
Resolved, that the K. of R. and S. be instructed to publish this Preamble and these Resolutions in the next issue of THE DARLINGTON NEWS;
