If they were made after the Legal Tender Act was passed, they, of course, had reference to that Act and no harm has been done by settling them on the paper basis. If they were made before the passage of the Act, and have ben settled according to its provisions, the settlement will probably be adjudged final in accordance since the Act went into operation, and which still remain unsettled, will also be settled in greenbacks, for such contracts were made with this specific understanding. But those, on the contrary, which were made prior to to the Act and still remain unsettled, will have to be adjusted on the specie basis which existed when they were made, without any reference whatever to the yaper notes of the Government. And all contracts made after such a decision shall be announced, will of course rest wholly on a specie basis, and if settled in any kind of paper currency, it must be only according to its relative value. All future transactions would have reference only to gold and silver soin, and would gradunlly come again into use, while paper would case only at the discount which its value requires.
