THE MAN THAT SOLD A WEST POINT CADETSHIP.

WASHINGTON, February 14.

The secret is at last out in regard to the sale of West Point cadetships. The disgraceful proceeding is now fairly fixed upon one of the South Carolina carpet-baggers, and there is reason to believe that several other honorable members of the same class have been playing a similar game.

A witness testified before the House Military Committee, to-day, that B. F. Whittemore, a representative in Congress from South Carolina, had sold his cadetship. A copy of a letter from Whittemore was shown dated at Darlington, S. C., May 12, 1869, and addressed to P. H. Kegler, formerly a banker of Charleston, offering to sell a cadetship at West Point for five hundred dollars.

The members of the committee declared that if this charge was fully proved, Whittemore ought to be expelled from the House of Representatives. Mr. Kegler has been summoned to produce the original letter.

His neighbors, and all who knew him intimately, will bear testimony to his kindness of heart and sympathizing nature, and feel they have lost a friend on whom they could rely, and whose memory they will ever delight to cherish.
