The Anniversary of the Elliotts! A Festive Occasion! Eloquent Speeches, &c.

In our last issue we published the programme of the above interesting festivities. We shall now attempt to give a somewhat detailed account of the incidents of this day which is always a gala one with the Fire Department of our town, as the Anniversary of the Hook and Ladder's, but more especially as the birth-day of their worthy Patron, the beloved and venerated Dr. Elliott.

In the afternoon the Elliotts, with their escort the Young Americans, paraded through the principal streets, making a very creditable display.

Early in the evening the company met in the Young America's hall, their own being used for the supper, and elected the following officers to serve for the ensuing year:

- Foreman—L. H. Wannamaker. Asst Foreman—M. B. Sistrunk. Treasurer—Stiles R. Mellichamp. Secretary—A. B. Walker. Solicitor—M. I. Browning. Surgeon—Dr. T. A. Elliott.

As soon as the business of the meeting was completed, the company with their guests proceeded to the Hook and Ladder Hall, where a very acceptable and well prepared collation awaited them.

Upon entering the hall no one could fail to be struck with the neatness and air of comfort which the scene presented. The evergreens and floral decorations gave evidence that the fair hand of woman was not lacking; and the snow white table cloths and tastily arranged viands gave a relish to all present.

As soon as this feast of the body was disposed of, which it is useless to say was well done, the tables were cleared and the feast of reason, wit and sentiment commenced.

The ball was opened by M. I. Browning, Esq., who responded to "THE DAY WE CELEBRATE."

In his usual felicitous style. He gave full credit to the ladies of Orangeburg for the success of the Hook and Ladder Company, and alluded to touching and appropriate terms to the worthy patron of the company, Dr. Elliott.

"THE YOUNG AMERICAS." In the absence of Capt. Dibble, was briefly and appropriately responded to by Gen Izlar.

"OUR CITY FATHERS" was eloquently responded to by Major Whaley, who did full justice to his barren theme. He made a speech which will long be remembered by all who heard him.

"THE BOARD OF FIRE-MASTERS" Brought to his feet Chief Harpin Riggs, who said in opening, that while he could not speak as well as the lawyers who preceded him, he was certain he could out-work all three of them put together. He then gave some practical advice to the Fire Department.

"OUR GOVERNOR" Being absent was represented by F. A. Schifley, Esq., who spoke to the point, but seemed to prefer that his principal should respond for himself next time.

"OUR CITY" Brought out J. H. Fowles, Esq., who pitched into the poet of the company, and intimated that he could make better poetry himself. He did not seem to think it was as good as Burns or Moore. He made some good points, and although short, his speech was well received.

"OUR COUNTRY" Was responded to by Stiles R. Mellichamp, Esq., who spoke glowingly of woman as "our country's" richest treasure, and the rising generation as her brightest hope. He attributed the low standard of public morals to Grantism, or the elevation of mediocrity and vice into high places. From Grant he said there sprung up "little Grants" in every community, who lived by deception and policy, boasting of that of which every jail bird was their equal, and every professional thief their superior. He concluded by urging a return to the purity of our fathers, and a strict adherence to the constitution as "Our Country's" only hope.

"THE JUDICIARY." Was represented by Capt. Mortimer Glover, who dwelt with considerable interest upon the purity of the bench as necessary to the prosperity of the land and the contentment of the people, and concluded with a happy and appropriate sentiment.

"THE PRESS" Suffered no detriment at the hands of our neighbor's editor, Jas. S. Heyward, Esq., who showed plainly that

for a paper to be the friend and defender of the people it must be free and untrammelled. His speech was delivered in his terse and animated style.

"THE LITERATURE OF OUR STATE" Was assigned to Capt. John A. Hamilton, who did full justice to the theme in a speech teeming with classic allusions. He reviewed the distinguished literati of our State, and concluded with the recital of one Timrod's sweetest lays.

"OUR CITIZEN SOLDIER" Was under the direction of Brig. Gen J. P. Izlar, who complained that Mr. Mellichamp had captured his infantry, alluding to the rising generation. In spite of this disaster Capt. Izlar made up on some anecdotes which kept the audience highly entertained.

Last but not least came "WOMAN," Responded to by Maj. T. B. Whaley. It is superfluous to say that Maj. Whaley did well. His reputation as a speaker is too well known. He said that his appreciation of "WOMAN" was best attested by his recent action. He kept his audience spell bound for the balance of the evening.

We cannot omit to mention as one of the most interesting and touching incidents of the evening, the presence and cheering remarks of Dr. Elliott. The deep feeling of the audience could not be concealed when the old gentleman alluded to his age and to the improbability of his meeting with the company at its next Anniversary.

At the conclusion of his remarks a resolution was unanimously adopted offering to the Doctor the good wishes of every one present, and the heart-felt hope that he would live to meet with them on other Anniversaries.

This ended a day long to be remembered by the firemen and citizens of Orangeburg.
