There will be four eclipses during the year 1878, two of each luminary, as follows :

An annular eclipse of the sun near 2 o'clock in the morning of February 2, which will, therefore, be visible to the people on this side of the earth's surface.

A partial eclipse of the moon in the morning of February 17th, visible from the United States.

A total eclipse of the sun July 29, visible to all parts of North America. A partial colipse of the mon in the afternoon and evening of August 12.


