We saw a head of wheat a few days since, grown by Major J. H. Hydrick on Bull Swamp, measuring seven inches in length and the grain not matured upon it. The Major has a field of seventeen acres pretty generally interspersed with such heads, caused by the rust blight. In view of the importance of this crop to our people, we would suggest experiments with the sulphur, and salt and ashes as indicated in the Times of last week. Three were recaptured but the fourth successfully evaded his pursuers and is now at large in the country. The jailer going for water, left the doors unfastened, and the prisoners came down stairs, concealed themselves in the closet beneath the steps and made their escape when Loyd had returned and was up stairs attending his business. This is the second time prisoners have escaped from jail within the last two or three months. If this is to continue it will cost the county less to throw open the prison doors and abolish the offices of Sheriff and Jailer; but, if to diminish crime, it is necessary to have a jail and, of a consequence, a jailer and a sheriff, then let us have such officer as will keep the prisoners securely, that the county suffer no unnecessary expense, or the property of citizens, hazard from crime.
