We understand that Mr. Styles H. Mellichamp made application for the Aiken School, and the election of teacher was had on Thursday last. Aiken is a growing town and if Mr. Mellichamp is the fortunate one, we wish him every success in his new field.

We were somewhat surprised to see in the Clarion of yesterday, a card from Mr. S. R. Mellichamp impeaching our motives for inserting it.

Now as to the facts. It is not denied that Mr. Mellichamp was an applicant for the Principalship of the Aiken school; it is not denied that the election of teacher was held on Thursday; it is not denied that Aiken is a growing place. From all that we could learn we were confident that Mr. Mellichamp would be the choice of the Trustees—and it is fair to presume that as he was an applicant he would have accepted if he had been elected.

The appearance of Mr. Mellichamp's advertisement in the Clarion on Friday, a paper which want to press 4 P. M. on Thursday, while the election of teacher came off on Thursday night—is no just reason why we should have withheld the publication of the facts as they came to us. It is apparent from the above that we are to thank the Trustees of the Aiken Academy for Mr. Mellichamp's well considered resolution not to go away but to stay here and reopen the Orangeburg High School. A school is of public importance—the selection of a teacher is a matter of public interest—the teacher is a public character and his movements are proper subjects for newspaper comment.

1. A County Convention of the Democratic Party of Orangeburg County is hereby called by a resolution of the County Democratic Executive Committee of the party, to meet at Orangeburg, C. H., South Carolina, on THURSDAY, the 12th day of September A. D., 1878, at 11 o'clock, A.
