

Certain States Privileged to Violate the Law.

Theoretically we are a nation. Whether we are such actually is another matter. Laws are enacted. In others the laws relating to internal revenue are but a little more than a dead letter. In New York a distiller must strictly observe the requirements of the statutes, and pay his taxes promptly and in full. Otherwise he may expect to answer for his disobedience, civilly and criminally. In some of the Southern States the case is widely different. In Georgia and South Carolina distillers habitually disregard the law. Now and then a culprit may be punished; but that is exceptional, most of those who violate the law being allowed to do it with impunity. If a distiller comes to court, to escape by pleading guilty on a promise of suspension of sentence.

Can a great country be governed in this way? Are New Yorkers to be bound by a law which South Carolinians and Georgians are permitted to trample under foot? How are honest distillers, who pay their heavy taxes, to compete in business with lawless men in the same line who pay no taxes whatever? It is apparent from the official records that the Government of the United States is almost impotent in certain States, so far as enforcing the Internal Revenue Laws is concerned, as it was in the time of the rebellion.

Things cannot be permitted to go on in this way very long. There is little if any hope of an improvement under Mr. Hayes. Shall he be permitted to have his term? — Sun.

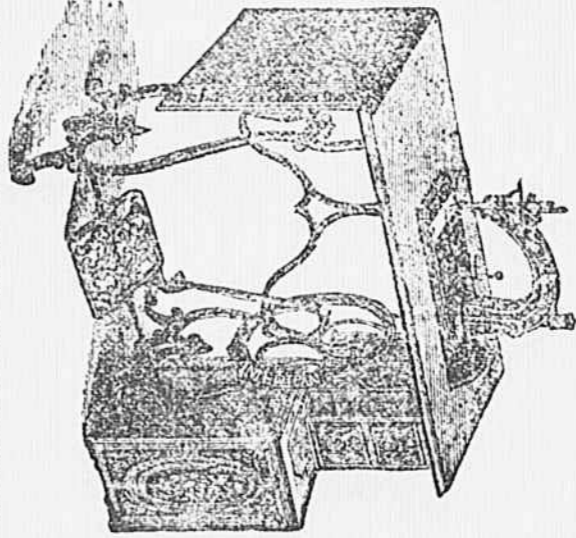
