We received information late Friday evening, the 6th inst., that there was to be a political meeting held in Poplar Township at Bookharts' poll by the Radicals on the next day at eleven o'clock, and that Straker, Webster and Dancan were to hold forth. Accordingly a few straight-out Democrats repaired to the scene of action with a view of hearing what these worthies had to say. We arrived on the grounds promptly at eleven A. M and found about seventy-five colored men awaiting patiently for the above numsl gen-

who failed to put in an appear e. They, from indications, did not seem to relish the presence of the pale facesmuch. We lolled about un til about half-past one, when a mass enger arrived and made a report after which the meeting was organ ized with the following results: Ra-fus Felder chairman and Samuel Tilly, secretary. Shedrack Morgan explained the object of the meeting. Straker, Webster, Duncan an Lothers were to address them, but sail that Straker had received information that it would not be well for him to come down, Webster's wife or child was sick and Sam'l Duncan's father was ill This east a damper on the meeting, but they were somewhat revived by the assurance that other speakers would be sent and were expected every moment; these too failed to come. Wm. Paulling was the first speaker. He advocated the cause of Morgan, and urged his hear ers to pick the best men they had for office, and if they c uld not find them in the Republican party to fill out their ticket with white men (pointing to the Democrats.) Shedrack Mor gan spoke at some length explaining his position while a member of the Maccey house, and how he purged himse'f to obtain his seat in the Wallace house, and closed by advising all Republicans to stick together, and not allow wolves to get among the sheep and divide the flock, saying a house divided against itself would surely fall, but united could stand

the storm. I will add, his house is a mass of rottenness and great will be the fall it on the 5th of next November, During Morgans speech I could see there was strong opposition to him, but it was not fully developed until Sam'l Lewis took the stand and pitched into Morgan without gloves. He charge him with calling that meeting to redeem his character, and with purging himself to obtain his seat in the Democratic House of Representatives.
