FOR CONGRESS Hon. W. P. O'CONNOR. SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 14, 1878. PROCEEDINGS OF COUNTY CONVENTION.

The Convention was called to order at 12 M. by Gen. Jas. F. Izlar. One hundred and eight delegates were enrolled. Dr. J. C. Holman was called to the Chair, and a permanent organization effected by the election of the following officers: President—Dr. O. N. Bowman, 1st Vice-President—Dr. J. C. Holman, 2d Vice-President—M. J. Keller, 3d Vice-President—Dr. R. W. Bates.

Secretary—W. L. Glaze and J. N. Hook. The proceedings were opened with prayer by Rev. J. D. Priekett. Capt. Wannamaker moved that all the privileges of the Convention be extended to the Delegates from the new colored club, which had not the requisite number of members to entitle it to representation. Adopted.

Mr. Robt. Copes moved that no nomination be considered unless the nominee or delegate making the nomination pledge himself to support the nominees of the Convention as a whole. Adopted. The Convention then went into nomination by ballot, for five candidates to the Lower House, and the following nominees having received a majority of the votes cast, were declared the candidates of the Convention:

Capt. M. J. Keller. J. T. Shumaker. Capt. J. S. Bowman. W. C. Ibane. B. G. Frederick, (Col'd.) Nominations for County Commissioners resulted in the selection of L. S. CONNOR, EPHRAIM CUMMINGS. For School Commissioner: D. L. CONNOR.

On motion the nominations were made unanimous. Mr. W. A. Easterling offered the following, which was adopted: That the candidates nominated to represent the people of Orangeburg in the Legislature, pledge themselves to use their influence to adjourn by the Christmas holidays.

On motion the Convention voted its thanks to its officers and adjourned. The State campaign appointments are being filled in their regular order. Newberry had an enthusiastic meeting on the 10th instant when addresses were delivered by Col. R. M. Sims, Congressman Aiken, Attorney-General Yorman and Lieut. Gov. Simpson. Fifteen hundred mounted men were in line, all dressed in red shirts. Good order prevailed throughout the day.

For the Orangeburg Times. JAMISON, S. C., Sept. 9th 1878. Editor Orangeburg Times:

We received information late Friday evening, the 6th inst., that there was to be a political meeting held in Poplar Township at Bookhart's mill by the Democrats on the next day at eleven o'clock, and that Straker, Webster and Duncan were to hold forth. Accordingly a few straight-out Democrats repaired to the scene of action with a view of hearing what these worthies had to say. We arrived on the grounds promptly at eleven A. M. and found about seventy-five colored men awaiting patiently for the above named gentlemen who failed to put in an appearance. They, from indications, did not seem to relish the presence of the pale faces. We lolled about until about half-past one, when a messenger arrived and made a report after which the meeting was organized with the following results: Rufus Felder chairman and Samuel Tilly, secretary. Shadrack Morgan explained the object of the meeting. Straker, Webster, Duncan and others were to address them, but said that Straker had received information that it would not be well for him to come down, Webster's wife or child was sick and Sam'l Duncan's father was ill. This cast a damper on the meeting, but they were somewhat revived by the assurance that other speakers would be sent and were expected every moment; these too failed to come. Wm. Pauling was the first speaker. He advocated the cause of Morgan, and urged his hearers to pick the best men they had for office, and if they could not find them in the Republican party to fill out their ticket with white men (pointing to the Democrats.) Shadrack Morgan spoke at some length explaining his position while a member of the Maecey house, and how he purged himself to obtain his seat in the Wallace house, and closed by advising all Republicans to stick together, and not allow wolves to get among the sheep and divide the flock, saying a house divided against itself would surely fall, but united could stand the storm.

I will add, his house is a mass of rottenness and great will be the fall if on the 5th of next November. During Morgan's speech I could see there was strong opposition to him, but it was not fully developed until Sam'l Lewis took the stand and pitched into Morgan without gloves. He charge him with calling that meeting to redeem his character, and with purging himself to obtain his seat in the Democratic House of Representatives. At this stage of the meeting Morgan's friends became violent and interrupted the speaker, whereupon his friends took offence and a general state of confusion took place. Any one not knowing their nature would have expected a general engagement and looked to see blood flowing in streams, but no one was hurt except by the tongue which was used unscrupulously and in unqualified language. After some time comparative order prevailed, but Sam'l Lewis would not take the stand again. Several other speeches were made but the speakers were repeatedly interrupted, with the "Damned lie, Damned Rogue," attempts to fight, but I succeeded in taking notes of James Robinson's speech, in which he advised them to send the best men they had to the Legislature and do better in the future than they had in the past. Morgan was his man. In him were virtue intelligence and morality; and he saw no reason why he should not represent them for more than one term. He knew Mr. H. G. Sheridan had served six or seven years in the Legislature of this State and saw no reason why Mr. Morgan should not do likewise. Some men were riding blind horses about at night with no corn in their own houses, telling them not to curse their race and color; but that would not do. A great many whites were with them, and Democrats felt their interest, otherwise they would be in a bad fix to-day. Education, he said, was about to go down by ignorance but this must not be. Many were riding poor mules about at night with no crops in their field, but a few documents in their pockets saying, "Go the way I tell you," but he advised them to debate for themselves, saying they had been free thirteen years and it was time for them to be free. Previous to this, Democrats were invited to speak but declined preferring to enjoy the concert a little longer, but being called again one straight-out Democrat arose and said it was only necessary for him to explain why we were there, inasmuch as there had been nothing said against the Democratic party. We came to meet our friends Straker and Webster and were prepared to defend the Democratic party. He had not made up his mind that Mr. Morgan was so pure and spotless as he was represented to be, but he had made up his mind that he would not represent us in the Legislature, and closed by saying all their efforts were in vain as we intended to win. The question being asked, how he expected to win? he replied, by honest voting and fair counting. Another straight-out being called, he said we did not come to waste our ammunition on "small game," but they might hold their conventions, make nominations, and lose time working for their ticket, but as sure as the sun rose on the 5th of November, it would set on their defeat. Thus ended this

Radical meeting which we can say without hesitation, was a Democratic success. All we have to do is to meet them and not allow lies told on the Democratic party and the victory is ours. S. D. DANZLER.
