COLORED DEMOCRATS.

At a recent meeting of the Colcred Demo. crats of Barnwell, resolutions indorsing Gov Hampton, were passed by a large vote. These set forth that the promises, made by the Democracy under the leadership of our Governor, have been fully carried out, and that the colored people of that county have an abiding faith in the sincerity of our leaders and the guarantees of the party as to the permanent establishment of the political rights of all our citizens, irrespective of race. Co-operation with, what they style the Hampton Democracy, is assured during the present campaign, to scenre the election

of such men as avow themselves in sympathy with that policy. These resolutions reflect not only the affiliation of the Barnwell colored citizens with the Democracy, but every where, throughout the State, and especially in the up country, similar sentiments are expressed by the colored people, showing not only the popularity of Gov. Hampton, but plainly indicate what a powerful influence an honest political course will have upon those, who were but lately our political enemies. From the remarks of Judge Cooke before the Court House Club, and from the general tenor of our exchanges, the same feeling and willingness to co operate with us pervade the colored people of Greenville and other portions of the State. Even here in Orangeburg, the hot bed of Radicallsm, where our colored people have been hagridden, brow-beaten and bull-dozed by their leaders, there is a growing sentiment in favor of good government and the political doctrines set forth by our party. It is absolutely certain that this sentiment will continue to increase until the day of election and will give at least 1000 majority for Democracy. Orangeburg will certainly redeem the past and never again be enrolled as a Radical County. She will raise her head as proudly as any sister County, and, with her local advantages of elimate, fertility of soil, and superior natural resources, continue to advance in material prosperity and the happinees of her citizens. Even the most ignorant colored man sees the difference between Radical and Democratic rule; between the dangers that threaten the life of the citizen in the one, and the peace that assures his safety in the other; and between the want which tempted his family to dishonesty and the assurdance which cheers him with the hope of ultimate prosperity. He has, at last, been made to know that Radical promises were vain, their assertions false and their purpose self aggrandizement; he sees, also, that Democracy means rights for the citizon, peace for the family and success for the individual. Two years more of honest government , and fair dealing will make every negro in Orangeburg a stanch Democrat.

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
