Hampton's Day!

Last Thursday, by appointment of the State Executive Committee, was set aside as Hampton's Day for Orangeburg County, and our citizens had, for weeks, been preparing themselves to give their Great Chieftain a rousing welcome—one that would be a pleasure to the Governor, a gratification to the people and an honor to the County. Accordingly Thursday morning's sun found every road and path leading to our town thronged with wagons, carriages, buggies, horsemen and pedestrians—all dressed in the magic historical Red peculiar to South Carolina Democracy. Indeed Red Shirts, Red Jackets and Red *Daques* literally poured into our town from six to eleven o'clock, and still they poured until the wonder was where did all these people come from. The appearance of our town was one of universal redness. Besides the garments mentioned above, there were everywhere seen Red Banners from houses and across the street with appropriate mottoes inscribed upon them, long flying Red Sashes, Red Ribbons and Bouquets. Fiery horses dashed along the streets with Red Streamers flying from head and tail, bearing Red Riders in Red trimmed saddles and bridles. Near the Engine Hall had been erected a triumphant arch beautifully decorated by the ladies and bearing mottoes significant of the times, the people and the occasion. On a convenient position in the Old Muster Field, the Committee appointed for that purpose, had built a neat and substantial Stand for the Speakers and Magistrates and here again the fair daughters of Orangeburg displayed their artistic taste in most elaborate decorations of evergreens and Red.

Procession
The procession was formed at 10 o'clock, with its head resting upon the Court House Square, by Chief Marshal Capt. J. W. Moore assisted by Capt. J. B. Livingston, Capt. N. N. Hayden and G. W. Funnell, repaired in quiet order to the depot where Gov. Hampton and the visiting speakers were expected to arrive on the 10:30 train. The crowd here was not long kept in suspension, for soon the train came in sight and rolled proudly and magnificently to its position along side of the platform, and Oh! what a disappointment! What a fall there was in the spirits of that anxious throng when it was announced that Hampton was not on board. The news spread rapidly through the town causing universal expressions of regret by our citizens; indeed, a misfortune ten times more serious could not have befallen a people more than this. Orangeburg Democracy, however, would not yield even to this disappointment but rallied again as the Grand Procession of Two Thousand Horsemen rode through the streets escorting the carriage of Mr. N. Austin Ball, beautifully decorated with Red, and intended for Gov. Hampton but remaining here, Major DeLozier of the 3rd and General Garrison of the 2nd, our noble County Chairman.

cession were two pieces of cannon belonging to the Columbia Flying Artillery and commanded by Lieuts. Fereven and Bridges. These fired salutes at the Depot and the Speaker's Stand awakening Democracy to life for miles around and striking terror and consternation to the dying Radicalism of Orangeburg.
Two wagons with thirteen little red jacket boys in one, and thirteen little girls dressed in white and red sashes in the other, representing the thirteen States that won and established American Liberty.
A wagon carrying the Red-Shirt Cornet Band of Columbia who dispensed "sweet music" for the occasion was an attractive feature and added greatly to the enjoyment and success of the meeting.
Among the banners with appropriate mottoes inscribed, expressive of the feeling and sentiment of the several clubs, we noticed one with a red shirt unmistakably painted and this peculiarly expressive motto: "In hoc signo vinces" and ejaculated, Amen!
There were two sable youths upon two sable asses, indicating the spirit and determination, perhaps, of our incoming colored Democracy: We'll come, if it be on asses.
The column was closed by a few straggling darkies, indicative, doubtless, of the few hopeless Radicals who linger in rear of the triumphant Democrats.
Speaking.
After marching up Rail Road Avenue and down Russel street, the procession halted at the stand and the riders dismounted their horses and afterward joined the large crowd already assembled to hear the speaking. The meeting was called to order and after a most fervent prayer by Rev. W. B. Richardson, Gen. J. F. Izlar, in a few remarks, introduced Hon. M. P. O'Connor, nominee for Second Congressional District, who made one of his happiest efforts, encouraging the whites, instructing the colored people and assuring the whole County of the success which shall crown the efforts of the Democracy on the 5th of November next.
Mr. James G. Gibbs of Florida next addressed the meeting in one of his wittiest and most humorous strains. His after point was illustrated by appropriate anecdotes and contributed no little to the amusement of the crowd. Mr. Gibbs possesses a peculiar talent for occasions of this kind and his name will not soon be forgotten by the laughter-loving Democrats of our County.
Mr. W. C. Hane, nominee for the Legislature, spoke a few words forecasting his policy when in the discharge of the duties of the office to which he will be called in November next.
Gen. J. F. Izlar closed the scene in one of his best political efforts. We heard it characterized as the funeral of D. A. Straker and Post Master Webster; but we were especially pleased with his plain, positive and well timed remarks on the Radical ticket just put in the field and his severe but just comments upon the Democrats who would allow their names to be used as weapons in the hands of our enemies to strike their countrymen down. These were words from a true Democrat and bravely spoken embodying the true principles of pure Democracy. Surely they will not be passed unheeded by the gentlemen whose names were put in nomination by Webster and Livingston.
So closed this grand occasion—grand because of the spirit which prompted our noble people, and the multitudes, three or four thousand, who came together to show our Chieftain that Orangeburg Democracy was a unit.

here remarked that every thing must be kept secret, after this the authors of other letters could not be caught. All the nominations were made by Webster and Livingston except the name of Straker which was proposed by John Thompson. Webster recommended H. L. Rickenbaker, saying he had known him a long time, that he was no red shirt Democrat but a good and peaceable citizen and therefore nominated him for the position of School Commissioner.
The following ticket was reported for the Legislature: D. A. Straker, E. A. Webster, Richard Jefferson, Roy C. L. Arthur and J. M. Hughes. County Commissioner, Daniel Livingston, School Commissioner, H. L. Rickenbaker.
The report of Committee met with considerable opposition on the floor of the Convention especially from the lower St. Matthews section where Morgan and Sam Louis were contending for the position of member to the General Assembly and also from the Branchville delegates. Some expected E. Forest to be nominated, but instead of him they had a Democrat and they might as well vote for one Democrat as another. Members freely expressed themselves as preferring the regular Democratic ticket to the one reported by their Committee.
During the absence of the nominating Committee, Straker said the Democrats were outside with their money trying to buy up the members with the view of breaking up the Convention and as colored men were easily bought he wanted each and every man to stay in until the Committee made its report. He was satisfied that some of the members were easily and willingly bought by Democrats.
The Convention adjourned in much confusion and general dissatisfaction on the part of a large number of its members, some of whom swore they would vote the Democratic ticket before they would stand such a gag.
